Dear Friends,

All around us are the signs of spring. One of the things I enjoy most about this time of year are the flowering trees. The sight of a bare, brown, empty tree suddenly bursting forth with bright blossoms never fails to take my breath away.

When I lived in Portland we would have long, cold, wet winters and the first blossom on my camellia tree would fill me with a joy that was indescribable. Then would come the crocus, then the daffodils, then tulips, hyacinth, and finally iris as the flowering trees showered the city with pink and white petals. If

we had these year-round, they would not inspire us nearly as much. It is only because we have suffered through a long, dark winter bereft of blooms and had to look at bare, lifeless trees for months that we can truly appreciate this life that suddenly and unexpectedly bursts forth.

So it is with the Lenten season turning into Easter. Lent is a season when we remember the forty days when Jesus was tired, hungry, isolated, and sorely antagonized. How could one endure so much? Was he almost at his breaking point when the angels appeared to tend to him?

When the first Easter dawned, it was an unexpected new life after an enormous suffering and death. It defied expectation. It is when we are in our deepest despair that Christ's resurrection gives us the most hope.

It is in when we are at our worst that Jesus' message of new life and new covenant restore us. Easter is a time to remember how bad things were and are, and how precious of a gift God gave to people when they were in a long, dark winter.



In today's world, I am hearing many signs of despair. People lament the political climate, they lament the state of the environment, they lament the hostility and polarization in society, the plight of immigrants and refugees, and social ills such as poverty and hunger.

These are exactly the same issues that troubled the people who were with Jesus, and Jesus spoke of them often. As we enter this season of Easter, let us remember how far we've come, how much we still need to do, and how much Christ's redeeming resurrection overcame

similar times and infused them with a new hope and new life.

I invite you to pray with me that we remember how much God loved the world, we remember the lessons that Jesus taught us in His words and actions, and we believe in the promise that was given when he overcame death and rose again.

Born on September 30, 1970 in the South of Haiti (Les Cayes), Joseph was raised in a family deeply committed to Christ. He answered God's call to ministry by entering into the Evangelical Theological Seminary of Port-Au-Prince where he completed a Bachelor of Arts of Theology in 2003 while he was holding a secular job and some ministry responsibilities at his church. He was ordained six years later to preach the word of God.



After he immigrated into the United States in 2004, Joseph Mondesir has not only continued to serve Jesus in the Haitian community, but he is also engaged in various ministries at Valley Baptist Church of San Rafael, where he is an active member. He is also a student at the University of Texas of Permian Basin in Business Management. Joseph is a family man and the father of four beautiful girls (Esther, Sarah, Ruth, and Danielle).




