# The TIE

### Everything Under the Sun....



#### Dear Friends,

This summer begins with Pentecost on June 4. On Pentecost we celebrate the birthday of the church and remember the day when the disciples finally emerged from their upper room where they had been hiding since Jesus death, resurrection and ascension. The story of Pentecost is about many things: tongues of flame, the movements of the Holy Spirit, Peter's first sermon, a monumental baptism of 3,000 people!

But most importantly, Pentecost is about connection. Prior to Pentecost, the people were disconnected. The twelve disciples were disconnected from society. The people in the streets were disconnected by language, nationality, and geography. The disciples and people were disconnected from God. Since the ascension, the disciples felt disconnected from Jesus.


On the day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit changed all that. It came through like a mighty wind, blasted through the upper room, propelled the disciples out into the streets, and moved through all the thousands of people who were there that day. It helped them to be physically near each other. It helped people to see each other, hear each other, share with one another, understand each other, and connect to one another.

In a heartbeat, it turned strangers into companions on a life-long journey. People who may have passed each other in the street a hundred times without saying a word were suddenly talking with one another and understanding one another. Disciples who would have very easily (and happily!) stayed locked away from the world in hiding were suddenly conversing with the whole town and sharing their deepest selves with people. When Peter preaches he insists that the promise of Jesus is open to everyone there, and their children, and their grandchildren. All of a sudden the circle of connection grows wider and wider to the point that the first Christian community is formed, and they become the Body of Christ.

The second chapter of Acts paints a beautiful picture of a community in which everyone shares, everyone breaks bread together, worships together, teaches and learns together, gets along with their neighbors who are not part of the Christian community, and welcomes new people every day. What is most remarkable about this community is not so much how well they get along – though this gold standard of communal harmony cannot be discounted – but how only days before

they were all strangers from different countries, languages, and religions! The day of Pentecost tells us that where people are deeply divided, God can bring hearts together and build connection and community. During the season of Pentecost, which lasts all the way up until Advent, we will hear about how the Disciples and Jesus built communities and fostered connections everywhere they went. This is a powerful lesson for a deeply disconnected and divided world today.

I ask that you pray with me that the Holy Spirit continue to move in our lives and communities to bind us together in heart and harmony. Amen.



#### FCC SAN RAFAEL BUDGET REPORT



The Balance Sheet provided on the next page sets out the financial status of First Congregational Church of San Rafael as of May 22, 2017. At our Congregation Meeting in January we adopted a budget that "pushed" us as a congregation. A \$10,000 Challenge donation and matching funds were given as a way of helping us meet this budget.

The Council and Trustees are keeping a watchful eye on the income and expenses to ensure that we can meet the budget we adopted. You can help! While we may go on vacation, the expenses of the church don't take a vacation. Please keep up-to-date on your pledge while you are away. Pledges can be completed online at

http://fccsanrafael.org/online-giving/ mailed (8 N. San Pedro Road, San Rafael, CA 94903), or given to another member to bring on Sunday.

#### **Balance Sheet Explanation**

<u>Assets</u> represent money the church has in several accounts, including the checking account at Redwood Credit Union, which is the only source of ready cash. In November 1, 2016, we "borrowed" from ourselves (Pilgrim Hill Fund in the UCF Balanced Fund) \$10,000 to complete much needed facilities repairs and paint the church. Individual member pledges to "repay" the cost of this project over the next several years have the goal of returning these funds, with interest, to the Pilgrim Hill Fund.

<u>Dedicated Funds</u> represents money that has been donated or raised for specific purposes (Courtyard Project Fund, Building Fund, Pilgrim Hill Fund, Pastor Sabbatical Accrual, Memorial Funds, etc.). As such, these funds can only be used for the purpose(s) for which they were donated or set aside by the Church membership.

<u>**Liabilities**</u> represent funds that we owe (Courtyard Mortgage), have collected for specific offerings that needs to be sent (OGHS, Strengthen the Church, Neighbors in Need), and Renters' security deposits.

**\*NOTE** the different between Total Asserts and Liabilities is \$17,99912. This is the amount of cash we have at our disposal to cover expenses.

<u>Income</u> represents the money we have received since January 1, 2017 in pledges, loose offerings (non-pledge cash collected in Sunday offerings), rents, and some interest/miscellaneous income. Note that this total includes the \$10,000 Challenge donation as well as some, but not all, of the increased pledges by members to match this donation.

**Expenditures** represents the money spent since January 1, 2017 on 2017 budgeted items approved at the January Congregational Meeting, including Salaries & Benefits (pastor, musician, office manager, and cleaning), General Operating Expenses (Utilities, Supplies, Taxes, Insurance, Courtyard Mortgage, and Benevolences).

\*NOTE, based on Income and Expenditures, as of May 22, 2017; we have a budget surplus of \$5,132.09. However, if the \$10,000 challenge money was subtracted from this total, we would be behind the expected budget balance for this time of year by -\$4,867.91.

#### **SUMMER MOVIE NIGHTS**

#### JUNE 23 HIDDEN FIGURES

In the early days of the space race, when electronic computers were still in their infancy, large numbers of college-educated women were employed as human "computers." Day after day,

they manually ground through the mountains of calculations necessary to build and fly the first spacecraft. At NASA's Langley research center, in Jim-Crow Virginia, there were separate "colored" and "white" computer departments. *Hidden Figures* tells the story of three African-American women who rose from this background to become heroes of the space program. To do so, of course, they also had to overcome pervasive racial and gender barriers (which included no public recognition of their contributions until the 1990s.) In years to come, the story if these three tough women may well be seen as a key turning point in opening science and technology careers of all kinds to women.

#### JULY 28 SAME TIME, NEXT YEAR

Our July movie is an old favorite from almost 40 years ago: a romantic comedy that mixes laughs with serious insights about the nature of love and commitment.

In 1951, at an inn on the Mendocino coast, Doris (Ellen Burstyn), a 24-year-old housewife from Oakland, meets George (Alan Alda) a 27-year-old accountant from New Jersey, at dinner. The attraction is immediate, and they wake up in bed together the next morning. Neither has ever done this before, and both are happily married, with children. Still, they agree to meet for a single day each year as long as the attraction lasts.

We check in with them every five years as they reflect the silly fads and serious issues of those turbulent times, and, as they grow and evolve as people. in the film, as George and Doris deal with middle age and spouses' illnesses, They confront the line between zipless fantasy and real-world commitment and (in their own special way) respect it.


