Everything Under the Sun....



Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Years ago I served as Youth Minister at a Korean Presbyterian Church. One of their traditions was to have an annual contest wherein the youth were chal-

lenged to memorize an entire chapter from the Bible with cash prizes for the best recitations. It was the Youth Minister's job to choose the passage. Even though I had serious reservations about this contest tradition and few of the youth were interested, I went for my favorite passage: Acts 2, the story of Pentecost and the First Christian Community.

On May 24 we celebrated Pentecost, and every week during the time of Centering Silence we invite the Holy Spirit. The rush or spirit, breath, wind. This Spirit that moved over the waters in the Creation Story of Genesis and called life into being. This Spirit that descended like a dove when Jesus was baptized. This Spirit that on Pentecost compelled the disciples out of their safety zone to share their witness with all who would listen. It was this same

Spirit that let everyone present hear the stories in their own mother tongue. What is amazing about Pentecost is what happened afterward. The book of Acts paints a picture of a first Christian Community made up of an incredibly diverse set of 3000 people.

As I watch how FCC San Rafael is changing, I have to admit it sometimes feels a little chaotic. With new people coming in, long-term members embracing new roles, our ongoing conversation about Race Relations, our involvement with the Marin Interfaith Council, and the growing momentum of Sunday School, the Homework Club, Bible Study and the REST Program, I feel sometimes a little like the disciples in the midst of a whirlwind, compelled to leave their comfort zone and engage in a much larger conversation. It must have been frightening and exciting at the same time. It rendered them deeply

vulnerable and yet incredibly authentic. It broke the ties that were keeping them in a closed circle and freed them to build many new connections.

On the day of the contest I found myself nervous and negative. I didn't like this contest and had lots of good reasons why. Several last-

minute issues—including that none of the kids wanted to participate—had threatened to derail the event at the last minute, and I was in a foul mood.

But then an eleven year-old Korean-American girl stood up. With a quiet but clear voice she began to speak the second chapter of Acts perfectly from memory, telling the story of how the disciples were compelled to go out with the people and listing all of their myriad nationalities.



She spoke Peter's first sermon, telling about Joel's prophecy of the day when the Spirit would be poured out on all people, men and women, young and old. She spoke Peter's words telling who Jesus was, and King David's message of hope in the Messiah during the darkest of times. She spoke about repenting of unhealthy ways and receiving the Holy



Spirit, that the promise is there for all people and their children and descendants. Finally, she spoke of the first Christian community, where everyone had enough. Where everyone shared. Where everyone got along. Where everyone ate meals together with glad and joyful hearts. Where this Church had the goodwill of all the people and welcomed newcomers day by day.

Out of the whirlwind came the clear voice of a child with a powerful message of peace, hope, and love,

and we were all transformed. Tears flowed.

Out of the chaos doesn't always come order, but with the Spirit's help come relationship, equilibrium, and peace. As we enter the season of Pentecost, in the midst of all of this activity and conversation, I see community coming together in strange and wonderful ways. Bridges, relationships, and ties are being built between Pilgrim Park, a local high school, a church, and the surrounding community. People of all different faith traditions, nationalities, and cultures are coming together to solve a common problem and relationships are being formed. We are learning to hear each other in our own mother tongue.

I ask that you pray with me as we go forward together that we might stay open to the Spirit and to each other

June 7 Mark 5:1-20

This passage about Jesus healing a demon-possessed man by casting the demons into a herd of swine has puzzled people for centuries. When we dig into the symbolism of the name and the swine within the socio-political context of Roman-occupied Jerusalem, this strange tale takes on a much clearer meaning with powerful implications and signs of hope for today's political climate.

June 14 2 Corinthians 5:1-17

This Sunday we will be joined by **Rev. Faune Towery** as Pastor Tracy attends the Northern California Nevada Conference Annual Gathering. Come learn as Rev. Towery explores Paul's thoughts to the Corinthians and Walking in Faith.

June 21 Matthew 9:18-26

This story-within-a-story contains two wonderful tales of Jesus healing a hemorrhaging woman and a sick little girl, as well as a strange phenomenon which occurs in none of the other healing stories. Could it be possible that even Jesus underestimated his own abilities, and how can this inform our own calls to serve? We will also be honoring Father's Day, so please join us!

June 28 Acts 8:26-30 and Matthew 19:1-12

You might think that the story of Philip baptizing the Ethiopian Eunuch, Jesus' thoughts on divorce, and Marc Anthony and Cleopatra have nothing to do with one another. However, when we look at the historical, cultural, linguistic and political atmosphere of these texts, we find that these historical players were actually intricately connected. Much to our surprise, these stories have enormous implications for Lesbian and Gay rights and Race Relations in the United States today. In honor of San Francisco Pride, we will be exploring this passage because it has a lot to teach us about honoring and welcoming the lesbian and gay community in the church today.

We will look forward to seeing you there!




JUNE 3 BIBLE STUDY - 6:00-7:30 PM


SUMMER CHURCH CAMPS ARE TERRIFIC!



MOVIE NIGHT JUNE 26 AND JULY 3 ANGELS IN AMERICA

Tony Kushner's Angels in America, A Gay Fantasia on National Themes is a landmark of American theater. More than any other work of art, it captured the impacts of the AIDS crisis of the 1980s on our society, our politics and our religious life. (It also earned condemnation from the right for naming and shaming Ronald Reagan's inaction on AIDS.)

A decade after its stage triumph, *Angels in America* gave birth to what is probably the greatest recent movie most people have never seen.

In 2003, Mike Nichols directed *Angels* as a six-hour mini-series for HBO, sticking very closely to the script of the play. Also as in the stage play, a core cast of lead actors (which included Al Pacino, Meryl Streep and Emma Thompson) each played multiple roles. The stage play won the Pulitzer Prize, and Nichols' film won dozens of Emmys and other TV awards. However, it was never released in theaters.



We'll watch *Angels in America* over two nights, just as the play was intended to be seen in the theater. Join us!

Friday June 26 and Friday July 3 at 7 PM in the De Haan Center at Pilgrim Park.

There is much, much more to Angels than politics, which is why it is so gripping. Were it a didactic ideological piece, it would be deadly. But Mr. Kushner's story is built on characters, gay and straight alike, who fight timeless battles over love and betrayal even as they struggle with the meaning of faith, family and America itself at an apocalyptic moment in the life of their nation. . . if anything, Mr. Kushner's writing has gained in pathos with age. What he has to say about coping with unfathomable loss and the terror inflicted by covert, death-dealing cells at the end of the last millennium speaks to us more urgently than ever.

PASTOR TRACY TO LEAD CHURCH GROWTH WORKSHOPS AUG. 29 AND SEPT. 26

Our Pastor, Rev. Tracy Barnowe, is a recognized expert on church growth. For over 10 years she has consulted with churches and non-profits to create long-term and short-term revitalization plans that work.

Demand for these consultations have grown so much that this year that Rev. Barnowe is trying something new: Instead of consulting with one church at a time, she will be conducting two all-day Church Growth Workshops here in San Rafael for multiple teams from interested churches. The workshops will be held on August 29 and September 26.

In both workshops, the emphasis will be on practical techniques and live role-playing exercises



The workshops are priced for a team from a church to attend, since that's by far the most effective way to learn these techniques. A single fee of \$500 pays for up to five participants from the same church. (10% discount for early registration.)

Workshop #1: Visitor Retention — The first workshop, on August 29, will focus on practical steps you can take to increase the likelihood that first-time visitors will return a second time. One Bay Area church using these techniques achieved an 88% return rate for first-time visitors. You'll learn comfortable ways to engage visitors and practical, effective ways to follow-up with them.

Workshop #2 Interpersonal Outreach — The second workshop, on September 26, will address ways to overcome the reluctance that members of progressive churches often feel to doing personal outreach on behalf of their church: "Won't people think I'm pushy?" "Isn't that more what fundamentalists do?" Rev. Barnowe will teach ways to talk to others about your church that are authentic, personal, and comfortable.
