Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Colleen Beery shared recently a ritual of gathering stones from the places we go on travels during the summer. In the fall when we all bring together our own individual stone and varied waters to the altar, we create something natural and beautiful.

When I watch how FCC San Rafael moves within its community, I think of the passage from the third chapter of the book of Ecclesiastes - For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven...a time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together.

As I write this I am celebrating the first day of our Pilgrim Park Summer Camp, where we had fourteen children and counting. The children come from a variety of places—India, Mexico, El Salvador, Korea, the United States, Africa. Gathered together they create something beautiful and new. We learn so much from watching their enthusiasm, creativity, friendships, inquisitive natures, laughter, and smarts. When we gather them together with the teachers and the volunteers, the parents and the church members, the beauty grows as I see each express his or her individual gifts and in turn bless the other.

We gather each Sunday as a congregation and then go out to work collaboratively with the REST Shelter Dinners and Homeward Bound, the Marin Interfaith Council and Pilgrim Park, the Marin County Food Bank and Ritter Center. We break bread together with other churches in an Multicultural Food Fair and then send supplies to Every Dollar Feeds Kids in Cuernavaca, Mexico. I see our stones gathering together and then casting away again in an ever-widening web that expands and contracts like the ripples from many stones dropped into a pond at once. We bless and are blessed continuously.

At our first Youth Event this summer, Lynn Grant spoke to the youth about how good it felt to break bread with the homeless women at the REST Shelter Dinner, and how she was inspired in her work by the scripture, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (Matthew 25:40). She spoke of how we find Jesus in each other when we serve.



Indeed, the more we gather our stones together in different circles, the more we find Jesus in each other. When we begin to see God in all things, we know we are on the right path.

This month I am remembering how I came to FCC San Rafael for the first time one year ago. As I have spent time with you and served with you, moving through so many of the circles, it has been a blessing to see God in so many places. I look forward to seeing you all when we gather our stones together on August 23, so that we might share where we have seen God on our journeys.

July 5 Mark 6:14-29

The story of Salome and John the Baptist is one of the most dramatic and engaging stories in the gospels, depicted in art, film and literature throughout centuries. How could a dancing girl at a party end in such a gruesome tragedy? Clues buried in the text tell a tale of politics, lust, corruption, and vice—all true events in history. But can we find hope in this sordid tale?

July 12 Amos 7:10-15.2

Please welcome special **Guest Preacher Tad Hopp**, while Pastor Tracy is on vacation. Hopp comes to us with a wealth of experience in working with youth and directing summer programs. He has completed his Master of Divinity and is pursuing ordination through the Presbyterian Church. This summer he is working at the San Francisco Night Ministry and also serving as the Program Administrator for our Pilgrim Park Summer Camp. Please join us to hear Mr. Hopp's message, Courage to Speak.

July 19 Corinthians 5:11-17

Please welcome special **Guest Preacher Yani Davis**, while Pastor Tracy is on vacation. Yani Davis is entering her second year at San Francisco Theological Seminary. She is pursuing ordination through the Presbyterian Church. An accomplished musician, Ms. Davis was recently a featured performer of Christian Hip-Hop at Rhythms of Faith in the Millennial Generation. She will be preaching about the Gospel According to Nina Simone: A New Dawn, A New Day.

July 26 Matthew 17:1-13

When we read the Transfiguration of Jesus, we not only find symbolism and references to the Old Testament, but also very human reactions to an extraordinary event. We will explore both the deep mysticism as well as the hilarity that results when ancient collides with modern and human meets divine.



August 2 Matthew 6:1-15

The Lord's Prayer (Our Father) is something that we recite every Sunday, but how well do we really know it? Why do we pray, and what are we praying for? We will explore the cultural and socio-historical origins of the different versions (trespasses vs. sins vs. debts) and look at possibilities for contemporary translation in our own modern context.

August 9 Matthew 13:1-13

The Parable of the Sower is a familiar tale with powerful implications for our modern era where churches and denominations are in decline. This simple story is actually rich with timeless wisdom that can be applied today in progressive churches. When we look at the reasons behind both church decline and growth in our modern era, we can learn practical lessons for maximizing our own efforts to welcome new people and build community.

August 16 Genesis 19:1-11, 24-26, 30-38

The story of Sodom and Gomorrah is often used to justify the disenfranchisement and abuse of our lesbian and gay brothers and sisters. Consistently mistranslated, taken out of context and misinterpreted, it often leaves us with disturbing questions about the nature of abuse and why God allows it. However, when we put this passage back into its proper literary and linguistic context, we find that it actually paints God as a champion of the oppressed and gives a message of hope and redemption for people in even the most dire of circumstances.

August 23 2 Kings 5:1-14

Please join us for a special healing service with stations for cleansing, forgiveness, letting go, anointing and prayer. We will explore the story of the Healing of Naaman the leper, whose fiery characters and deep symbolism teaches us the power not only of faith, but also of changed attitudes.

August 30 1 Corinthians 6:9-11

We will be looking into a passage that has frequently been used to dehumanize the LGBT community. It is also one of the most consistently misinterpreted, misunderstood and mistranslated passages about same-sex relationships in the Bible. Join us as we take a strange and sometimes hilarious jaunt through history as we explore the translation of this passage. When put back into its proper linguistic and historical context, we find it has a much more positive and inclusive message than we have been led to believe.

She shared how the parable of the sheep and the goats, of Matthew 25, inspired her, especially when Jesus tells his disciples, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." The group then helped to load up all of the towels collected on Towel Sunday for delivery to Homeward Bound.

Next, the kids moved to the kitchen to prepare several dishes for the REST Shelter Dinner the following evening. When the kids were considering the decorations for the desserts (which involved six different colors of frosting AND sprinkles), they all agreed on one thing: their desire to convey their prayer for the happiness of the women who would be sheltered that evening. So on the top of the cake and brownies, they wrote a single word: "HAPPY." Special thanks to Marcus, Taylor, Tristan, Michael, Rosemary, Faye, and to Lucinda Ray who provided all of the ingredients and recipe for the meatballs and sauce.

PILGRIM PARK SUMMER CAMP OPENS

The Pilgrim Park Summer Camp began on June 29, with 14 students and counting! Sponsored by Pilgrim Park and our congregation, the goal is to beat the achievement gap in Marin County. For six weeks, from June 29 - August 7, we will be piloting a dynamic program to help students retain what they learned during the previous school year and give them a leg up on the next.

Students are learning complex academic subjects presented in a fun, hands-on camp format. Session topics include biology, chemistry, mathematics, painting, problem solving, theatre, Spanish, business development, music, and scarf juggling. Camp runs from 9 to 11 AM Mondays - Fridays, with two subjects presented each day.

Program Administrator Tad Hopp has done a wonderful job of organizing teachers, students, volunteers, supplies, registration forms, background screenings, scheduling, and getting us off the ground barely a week after he started.

These are meals for homeless women in Marin County at the Women's Winter Shelter Program in San Rafael. Officially called Marin REST, which stands for Rotating Emergency Shelter Team, this is a program of the St. Vincent dePaul Society.

INCOME UP, GOALS EXCEEDED BUT YOUR HELP IS STILL NEEDED

At a recent Board of Trustees meeting, our Treasurer reported that our income and pledges are up significantly over previous years. We are also on target for the goals we adopted at our Congregational Annual Meeting in February. Here is a review of our goals and how we are meeting them:

- 1. Worship God, Celebrate the Sacraments: We are hosting dynamic worship services, tackling tough topics and challenging pieces of scripture. Attendance is up and new people are visiting often and returning regularly. We are enjoying special Sundays, such as honoring graduates, Pride Sunday, Veterans, Blessing of the Animals, and Children's Sabbath.
- **2. Preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ:** Our Sunday School is growing, and we are launching a new Youth Program with monthly meetings for grades 6 and up (see page 7). Children are participating in the worship services as readers, communion servers, greeters, and musicians. We have hosted two Bible Study series this year on social justices issues within our current ministries and race relations, and we begin a third in August.
- **3. Extend the Heritage of the Christian Faith:** New people are visiting regularly, and many are staying. Two growth workshops are scheduled this fall on Newcomer Retention and Interpersonal Outreach. We have hosted multiple events bringing members of the community in our doors.
- 4. Realize the Unity of All Churches in Christ: We continue our efforts with the Marin Interfaith Center in the areas of homelessness, the education achievement gap in Marin County, and collaboration with many faith traditions. We are helping extend the REST Shelter Dinner Program during the summer with three additional dates. We will be collaborating with the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Marin on hosting the Our Whole Lives sexuality education course for our middle and high school students this fall. At the Food Fair sponsored by Every Dollar Feeds Kids, we worked with three other churches to raise money to feed hungry children in Cuernavaca, Mexico.
- **5. Strive for Righteousness, Justice and Peace in our Common Life:** We have enjoyed growth in faith and fellowship through our Bible study classes. The Golden Girls meet monthly, the Pastor and many church members visit shut-ins and those in crisis, and we enjoy special get-togethers such as the Twelfth Party, Walker Creek Retreat, and the coffee hour every Sunday after worship.

6. Render Loving Service for the Betterment of the People in our Community and the World: We support the REST Program, Ritter Center, Homeward Bound, and five annual offerings through the United Church of Christ. We have expanded our Homework Club into a six-week academic Summer Camp, serving fourteen children, more than twice the attendance of the Homework Club. (**NOTE:** this grant is outside of our annual budget, and is co-funded by the Pilgrim Park Board and the Pilgrim Hill Fund (see page 7). We are continuing our Sacred Conversation on Race that we began in the spring with the Remembering Selma Photographic presentation, Bible Study on Race Relations, Movie Night featuring Selma, and the upcoming performance Cops & Robbers on August 15.

Halfway through the year, we are meeting or exceeding our goals in every area of our Vision.

However, we are slightly short of the budget we agreed on at the Annual Meeting in February. After a strong start at the beginning of the year, our donations have waned slightly. If we continue on our current track, we will have raised more than last year but will come up about \$10,000 short of our budget by the end of the year.




- Some folks have turned in their pledge forms for the year and have been generously donating toward them. To those, we thank you!

June 18, 2015 - Pilgrim Park Board Meeting Notes

- Heard that 2014/15 operating results were better than budgeted for the first 11 months.
- Approved the 2015/16 budget.
- Approved a capital replacement budget of \$170,000.
- Heard a presentation on solar electricity generating for common areas from a representation of Solarcraft.
- Heard management's report on community activities, including Food Bank and bread deliveries, upgrades to the computers in the John Starkweather Computer Center, recycling, the celebratory ice cream social, Dominican nurses and nutritional visits, etc.
- Heard an update on our continuing sewer problems. The bottom line is that when they fail, we fix them. In this case we found a defective patch under the parking lot from 1970 as well as a studio's sewers that have failed.
- Discussed the regular inspection of the structural integrity of the three unreconstructed decks and several landings. All appear to be in excellent condition.
- The community garden adjacent to the church is thriving again.

The biannual Pilgrim Park/church picnic will be in August – Date to be confirmed.

This remarkable performance begins at 8 PM. Come, experience, and discuss The Piper's revolutionary play, *Cops and Robbers* as directed by Ami Zins and Lew Levinson, a sharp look at the dysfunctional relationship between law enforcement, the media, and the Black community.

Centered on an officer involved shooting, writer/performer The Piper takes the viewer on an emotionally charged ride with unexpected twists and turns. He seamlessly travels through 17 characters, each with his own convictions, logic, and prejudices. *Cops and Robbers* takes no prisoners and challenges views to question all preconceived notions of "right" and "wrong."

Jinho "The Piper" Ferreira is a rapper, actor, and screenwriter from Oakland, California. He is one-third of Flipsyde, an alternative hip-hop band that has toured internationally with artists such as Snoop Dogg, The Black Eyed Peas, Akon, The Game, Busta Rhymes, and more. Flipsyde has written anthems for the 2006 Winter Olympics and the 2008 Summer Olympics. The band continues to enjoy several song placements in television, film, and sporting events. In 2009, Piper won the Creative Promise Award for screenwriter at the Tribeca Film Festival for his CIA thriller: *Walter's Boys*.

In the spring of 2010, Piper paid his way through a Bay Area law enforcement academy, eventually graduating in the top percentile and delivering the commencement speech. The paradox of being a member of the Black community and a hip-hop artist, while simultaneously working in Law Enforcement, served as the inspiration to write *Cops and Robbers*.



MOVIE NIGHT JULY 31 THE IMITATION GAME (no Movie Night in August)

Alan Turing is a towering figure in 20th century history who was virtually unknown in his own time. He conceived of and built the first working programmable computer. With that computer, he and his team broke the German "Enigma" code, which many feel did more to shorten WWII than any other technical achievement.

Shortly after the war, still unknown to the general public, he was hounded to his death by police in 1954 because of his homosexuality, which was still a crime in Britain. Finally, all this took place in the context of Turing's perceptual and social handicaps, which are recognized today as high-functioning autism.

In the past 20 years, recognition of Turing's unique talent and contributions has grown, culminating in this 2014 film. *The Imitation Game* was nominated for eight Oscars, including Best Actor for Benedict Cumberbatch as Turing and Best Supporting Actress for Keira Knightly as mathematician Joan Clarke, who fought her way through gender bias to become the only woman on Turning's team.



BIBLE STUDY BEGINS AUGUST 26 Wednesdays, 6:00-7:30 PM

Please join us for a special eight-part series this fall, from August 26-October 14. The focus is Reclaiming the Bible: Biblical Implications on Law and Society, a critical study of the Bible's most controversial passages.

Throughout history and in recent months, many parts of the Bible have been used to justify laws and social policies that perpetuate continual abuse of and disenfranchisement of the LGBT community, the subjugation of women, sustained destruction of the environment, and fear-mongering around the devil and the end of times.

However, when we use critical scholarship to learn about the original language and socio-historical context, we can be surprised to find what a positive and inclusive message they have in today's time for today's people, regardless of faith background. Please bring a Bible if you have one, or borrow or purchase one (\$15) when you come. Please bring finger food to share.


