


HONORING THE R.E.S.T. VOLUNTEERS - MAY 20


This is something that has been so much a part of our congregation's commitment to outreach for many years. It brings joy, both to the givers and to receivers.

NEW "CARE TEAM" PROGRAM BEGINS

What happens if you become ill and cannot attend church? How can you be in contact with church members and church developments if you are unable to attend services for a long period of time? A number of wonderful parishioners do visit many of those who are ill or homebound, and Pastor Sally visits those with particular needs. But her time is limited and the Board of Ministry would like to be more certain that everyone who wants a gets one on a regular basis.



The Board of Ministry has wrestled with this question, and at the suggestion of Pastor Sally, has developed the Care Team program. Here's how it will work:

- The year will be divided up among four teams each team will have three members.
- Each team will be responsible for visits every four months, for a month at a time.
- Here are the team Captains, followed by their members:

MOVIE NIGHT MAY 25 - THE THEORY OF EVERYTHING

Stephen Hawking, who died on March 14, was arguably the most creative mind in physics since Einstein. He made major advances in our understanding of black holes, the nature of time, and the connections between quantum mechanics and relativity. And, he accomplished all this while battling a rare, slow-moving form of ALS.

But who was the person behind the legend? *The Theory of Everything* is based on a memoir by Hawking's first wife, Jane, and focuses mainly on his days as a student and struggling young faculty member at Cambridge. Science aside, he was a complex, sometimes difficult character, and that is the focus of this intimate, very personal film. (Our guarantee: No Physics Required!)



Eddie Redmayne's portrayal of Hawking

won the 2014 Oscar for best actor in a leading role, and Felicity Jones was nominated for the corresponding Best Actress award. In Britain, the film was nominated for 10 BAFTA Awards, and won 3, including Best Picture.

DID YOU KNOW?

The United Church of Christ came into being in 1957 with the union of two Protestant denominations: the Evangelical and Reformed Church and the Congregational Christian Churches. The Congregationalists evolved from the early Pilgrims and Puritans in New England and included some of the leading abolitionists. The Evangelical and Reformed Church was a union of several mostly German denominations and included some of the most influential theologians of the 20th century, including Reinhold Niebuhr and Paul Tillich.

PILGRIM PARK - A LITTLE HISTORY

Now that the recent flurry of move-outs, renovations and move-ins has almost been completed, it's time for a little history of the project.

The Beginning - When our church moved from downtown San Rafael, the congregation acquired a parcel that was much bigger than necessary. After selling off a little for an



apartment house, the pastor and leadership decided to borrow \$1.5 million on a 1% government loan program for affordable housing and build Pilgrim Park. It opened in 1971. A separate legal entity was established, a management company was chosen, and the board of directors was selected from church members. History has proven that the overall design concept and size of the complex were excellent. History also disclosed some problems.

Some Corrections - The management company proved to be incompetent and dishonest. We brought in a new company, who promptly brought in new onsite management. Time proved that some construction details were not the best. We didn't have the money for the major repairs that were necessary. So, we borrowed \$4 million and corrected most of the construction faults and built a new community center. It's important that tenants adhere to lease terms. Old management was lax and let a drug culture grow in the complex. New management embarked on a multiyear project to rid the apartments of the problem tenants and to make the neighborhood safe. The fencing around the complex, the lights, the cameras and much tighter management are the result of these efforts.


