Your Pastoral Search Committee is working hard to create a Church Profile. One of the questions they need to answer is this:

"Who is God calling us to become?"

The question is worth pondering.

The concept of "call" has fallen on hard times in the U.S. Many people think it is just another way of asking: **"Who do we want to be?"**

But it isn't. Those are two radically different questions. The first question would most likely be answered by the soul. The second question—by the ego.

Discernment of Call is a soulful process— process of listening, searching, contemplating. It requires humility and surrender. It acknowledges that we are not in charge. The truth is, we are not masters of our own destiny.

We are not, however, lackeys either.

Frederick Buechner says, "The place God calls you to is the place where your deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet."

By this definition, we are co-creators with God, working as partners. We listen to the still small voice in our hearts and pay attention to what gives us real joy. We take a few steps. We initiate an action and then wait to see how the universe responds. Did our actions produce anything good? Did they fill a need or hunger? Did they bring joy to ourselves or anyone? Does it seem right to take another step?

Perhaps we pray for guidance and God responds. Maybe an opportunity opens up for us. Or an insight spontaneously occurs to us. Perhaps we experience a surge of energy focused in a



particular direction. We then respond and follow the opportunity, insight, or energy flow. And so it goes. Like any partnership, it is an ongoing conversation.

If our intention is:

- To be in partnership with God,
- To complete the tasks placed before us with integrity and goodwill,
- To respond to the needs of those around us with compassion and care,
- To use our gifts and talents to make the world a better place,
- To stay in touch with our deep gladness and share it with the world,

Then we will have answered the call.

If we do these things we can trust that we will become the people, the church, God is calling us to be.

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION

Greetings to our beloved church family!

Several recent events have made us aware of how very important it is to have current and accurate emergency contact information for all of our members and those who regularly attend services. When accidents or medical emergencies occur at church, it is so helpful to quickly call that person's family member or close friend so they can offer help, advice, and support. Perhaps they would meet the person at the hospital, or drive them to a doctor, or bring from home any medications that person regularly takes. To respond quickly



and effectively, we need to have the phone numbers close at hand. Cell numbers are probably the most useful.

We also need to know who to call in case someone suddenly stops attending and we are concerned about that person's wellbeing. As a church community, we care about each other and want to enfold one another in a network of love.

Recently, we invited people at church to fill out Emergency Contact Information forms which have been collected and are being compiled into a list. Jackie Dema generously volunteered to contact anyone who had not filled out a form and offer them the opportunity to supply that information. We hope you will share with us the names and cell phone numbers of those people who would be the most helpful to you in case of emergency.

Are you allergic to anything? If so, would you like to include that information on the list? It might be useful in case of an emergency. This is, however, completely voluntary. Only share as much information as makes you comfortable.

This list will not be published. A copy will be in the church office. Another copy will be given to the pastor.

PRIDE MONTH - WHAT IS IT? WHY ARE WE CELEBRATING IT?



Gay pride or LGBT pride is the positive stance against discrimination and violence toward lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender (LGBT) people to promote their selfaffirmation, dignity, equality rights, increase their visibility as a social group, build community, and celebrate sexual diversity and gender variance. Pride, as opposed to shame and social stigma, is the predominant outlook that bolsters most LGBT rights movements throughout the world.

Pride month is celebrated in the month of June each year in commemoration of the Stonewall Riots in New York in 1969, where Gay Rights activists rioted to protest the harassment members of the Gay community were suffering at the hands of the police.

The United Church of Christ has been advocating for the support and inclusion of the LGBT community since April 12, 1969. In 1972 the UCC denomination ordained the first openly gay minister. The UCC has been on the forefront of fighting for the rights of the oppressed dating all the way back to the Congregationalists fighting for the human rights of the slaves that fought back on the Amistad in 1839, ultimately resulting in the Supreme Court declaring them to not be property and their ultimate freedom.

The First Congregational Church of San Rafael voted to become an open and affirming church in 1995, and has aggressively fought to help the outcast and welcomed those whom others have turned away. The church believes that "Jesus did not turn anyone away, and neither do we." Let us enjoy this month of Pride and celebrate the great history of our church and the bright future of our world.

Oak Dowling will be presenting a preview of his lecture and discussion titled "The Trial of Jesus." He intends to present this later in the summer at Dominican University.



NEW "CARE TEAM" PROGRAM HAS BEGUN

What happens if you become ill and cannot attend church? How can you be in contact with church members and church developments if you are unable to attend services for a long period of time? A number of wonderful parishioners do visit many of those who are ill or homebound, and Pastor Sally visits those with particular needs. But her time is limited and the Board of Ministry would like to be more certain that everyone who wants a gets one on a regular basis.



The Board of Ministry has wrestled with this question, and at the suggestion of Pastor Sally, has developed the Care Team program. Here's how it works:

- The year will be divided up among four teams each team will have three members.
- Each team will be responsible for visits every four months, for a month at a time.
- Here are the team Captains, followed by their members:

Pastor Sally has shared some important suggestions for effective visits with the teams. The program began in May.



MOVIE NIGHT JUNE 22 - MILK

June 23-24 will be Gay Pride weekend in the Bay Area, and this November will mark 40 years since San Francisco Supervisor Harvey Milk and Mayor George Mosconi were assassinated at City Hall. Also, we seem to be stuck in a time when brave, unselfish leadership on issues that really matter has gone missing.

Any of these would be a good reason to re-visit Gus Van Sant's landmark biography of Milk, but the most important may be that it is simply a terrific movie – possibly the most human depiction of a human rights figure ever filmed.

Sean Penn's Oscar-winning performance shows us the full scope of Milk's journey from a funny, selfeffacing, aging hippie. to a political leader who was able to help people understand that the battle to end discrimination against any minority is really a struggle to free all of us from our demons.

The United Church of Christ is the first historically white denomination to ordain an African-American, the first to ordain a woman, the first to ordain an openly gay man, and the first Christian church to affirm the right of same-gender couples to marry.

PILGRIM PARK NEWS

Community Life – Because residents live close together, use the central laundry, come to the community center for food, to report repair needs, etc., the residents are very aware of what's happening to their neighbors, who is ill, etc. In short, it is a



close knit community. The two recent deaths have been deeply felt and the remembrances in the community center well attended. Several serious illnesses have brought out the normal human caring. The unusual number of recent vacancies, new arrivals and movement of residents to different apartments will understandably change the dynamic among neighbors.

Selection of new tenants – We follow HUD rules for selecting tenants. If there are not interested applicants on our waiting lists by apartment size, we advertise in the IJ. Running the ad for one week produces enough applicants. We process the applicants on a first in basis. After a tenant is qualified, we maintain the remaining applicants on the list for the next vacancy in that apartment size. Whenever a vacancy occurs, we give preference to existing tenants who qualify because of family size for a larger apartment. Conversely, if a tenant's family size has decreased, we encourage them to downsize. Existing tenants can also qualify for a subsidized apartment when those become available. About half of the apartments are subsidized under Section 8.

Church members or friends may contact me or Margie at Pilgrim Park to learn about vacancies. Margie receives inquiries daily. High quality affordable housing is scarce and in much demand.
