Season of Gratitude

Love and Gratitude are the two attributes that form the foundation for a spiritual life. I recently read that of the two, Gratitude is the most sublime. I was surprised to read that. It got me thinking and I realized there is some truth in that statement.

Love can be confusing and difficult. It is often accompanied with desire or need. We tend to want to possess or control that which we love. Finding the balance between self-love and love of the other can be tricky. Love tends to be active. We want to give to the other. But when are we giving too much for our own good? When are our "gifts" actually crippling the other – preventing them from growing into their best self? Most of us spend our entire lives trying to negotiate the pathways of love. Finding the balance between closeness and distance; between helping and challenging; between giving and receiving.

I have heard that in other languages such as Persian, there are numerous words for "love" which distinguish between all the different types. In English, we

have just the one word: "love." That fact might account for a lot of the confusion.

Gratitude, on the other hand, is simple. We are simply grateful for what we have received and say "thank you." We do not ask for more. We do not yearn for more. Thus, the attribute of gratitude fosters contentment and inner peace. A life of gratitude centers on noticing all the blessings we have received, all the gifts that surround us. A life of gratitude does not wait until we have acquired our dreams in order to be happy. It does not require everything to be perfect before we can feel contentment. A life of gratitude is a life lived with a sense of appreciation and wonder.

Gratitude is essentially receptive, not active. We simply the receive the other with appreciation and do not try to change anything. In that way, we honor the other.



On the 23rd, you voted for the projects that you could 1) put your energy into and/or 2) put money into. The following four were the top vote getters by far:

- 1. Get the word out that we are a progressive church for the 21st century.
- 2. Special Events such as music concerts, lectures, and community cook-outs
- 3. Immigrant Support in partnership with Marin Interfaith Council
- 4. Improve Acoustics in Community Room



FACILITY UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

October Facility Update

During October we continued helping get ready for Abbey Montessori re-opening downstairs. We had all sewer-lines rotorized and are working with an electrician to get the outside downstairs lights working again.

In this area of high fire danger, we have had an arborist review our trees for both health and safety. It has been recommended that we remove the Eucalyptus trees between the pre-school playground and street as well as remove some other bushes and the smaller Monterey Pine mostly underneath the



taller Stone Pine. This would be in addition to pruning the dead wood and low branches of the other trees. The arborist believes these recommendations will reduce fire danger and make our existing trees healthier. The Trustees are considering these recommendations. Don't be too surprised if you see fewer trees blocking the view of our church from the street.

Still high on the agenda is refreshing the restroom by the office, which has peeling wall paper. The broken mirror did get replaced, but we are hoping someone will take on the project of beautifying the walls. Please contact David Knopf if interested.

For the holiday season, we all deserve a truly joyful movie, and *Moonstruck* could make the most hardened Grinch fall in love with New York at Christmas, going to the opera and Italian-Americans with big, operatic passions.

Loretta Castorini is a young widow, living with her family, who is about to settle into a "comfortable' second marriage with a man she merely likes. Then, in the most unexpected way, she discovers real love (and the opera) with a passionate baker who is, inconveniently, the estranged younger brother of her fiancé. It all ends well, and the complications are worked out against a visual love-letter to New York at the holidays and to the music of La Bohème.

Moonstruck was nominated for six Academy Awards and won three: Best Actress (Cher), Best Supporting Actress (Olympia Dukakis) and Best Original Screenplay (John Patrick Shanley.)

A THOUGHTFUL LETTER FROM ONE OF OUR MEMBERS

Is It Time To Change the Name of the Dixie School District?

There is an excellent Kindergarten through 8th grade elementary school district called the Dixie School District in San Rafael. Both of my sons attended school in the district and got an excellent education. I am a former school board trustee. I served on the school board from 1991 to 1995. During this time, there was widespread belief that the District was named after the granddaughter of James Miller, who donated the land and labor to build the Dixie school house, now a historical monument adjacent to Miller Creek Middle School. There was also a popular teacher named Dixie who worked at Vallecito, one of the three elementary schools in the district at the time I was a trustee. The issue of a name change has arisen periodically since before my tenure on the Board.

We now know that the name of "Dixie" came as a reference to the Old South with its history of slavery and segregation. When the Old Dixie School House was seeking national monument status, testimony was given by the granddaughter of the original owner of the land that is now the Dixie School District. Her name was not Dixie, but actually, Frances. The application to the National Park Service in 1972 states,

"Mrs. Leits (Mrs. Frances Miller Leits, daughter of Bernard Miller and granddaughter of James Miller) also uncovered the origin of the school's name when she stated that her grand-father, not being a man to turn down a challenge, named the building on a dare. Marin County, in 1864, was hotly pro-Northern, and the fact that several "gentlemen" from the South helped construct the first schoolhouse prompted someone to dare James Miller to name the school "Dixie." He did. Thus Dixie opened in March of 1864."

The Dixie School District was established during the Civil War (1861-1865). At the time, the Democratic party was strongly associated with the Confederacy. An article in the *Marin Journal* from June 4, 1891 states,

"The precinct or district itself (current area that includes the Dixie School District) has always been a Democratic stronghold, at some of the elections the entire vote polled being Democratic. During wartimes the district was called Dixie by the Republicans in derision, and the name clung to it ever since."

However, whether or not this information came to light, it would still be right to change the name. The common understanding of the term, "Dixie" connotes the Confederacy. This is reason enough to change the name. At a recent school board meeting, several African American residents spoke about the hurt that the name evokes. With the heightened awareness of Black Lives Matter, and the statues of the confederacy coming down, what we choose to name our public institutions has meaning. It sends a message to the world about who we are. We need to change the name of the District because the common meaning of "Dixie" does not represent the district I know. I am joined by three former school board trustees who also have children who went through the school. Judy Tipple (Phyllis McGuire (1994-2000), and Florence Webb (1981-1997) join me in urging the current school board to begin the process of finding a new name for the District.

The Marin Interfaith Council is in the process of taking a stand on this issue. The Congregational Church is known for speaking out on social justice issues. I thought you might be interested in learning about an issue in our backyard. Our Church Council stated that it would be a longer process of discernment to determine if we, as a church would take a stand. It would also take a vote of the membership in order for the church to endorse the change. However, individuals in the church are free to add their name as a member of FCCSR,
