#### TRAINS OF THOUGHT by REV. SALLY TRAIN



Your Pastoral Search Committee, after listening carefully to you, wrote the following statement to describe First Congregational Church of San Rafael:

Our congregation is a small, but mighty faithbased community that is welcoming, inclusive, theologically diverse, and seeking to deepen our spiritual lives as we journey together with God. We value diversity, embrace mystery, are open to growth, and provide a dedicated church family, concerned about each other, and striving for peace and justice, both locally and globally.

They then wrote the following in answer to the question, "Who is God calling us to become?"

God calls us to become a congregation that offers a diverse and inclusive community; one that nurtures and develops faith and acknowledges mystery. God's love leads us to welcome people of all ages and all racial groups, ethnici-

ty, sexual orientations, and gender identities. We are inspired to grow spiritually, follow the teachings and examples of Jesus, and express our faith through our missions and action, locally and globally. God guides us to be a light in the world, bringing hope, justice, and love and leading the way to overcome the darkness within us, among us, and beyond us.

Over the last few weeks we have talked about concrete actions we can take to embody this vision and make it a reality. I was delighted that our discerning process revealed a great deal of support for GETTING THE WORD OUT! Telling our neighbors who we are, what we stand for, and inviting them to join us. Putting together a "marketing plan" (to use a business term) to communicate to the world what we have that is unique and valuable.

As a minister, I tend to be creative and innovative. I tend to create new programs, events, or special



worship services. I have consistently found my greatest frustration to be this: if I am creating the event, I do not have time or energy to also creatively promote the event! ### **PASTOR SALLY'S TIME WITH US EXTENDED**

Our original covenant was for Pastor Sally to be with us at least until September 2018. At the recommendation of the Trustees, the Council

voted to extend her covenant with us at least 6 months, until the end of March 2019.

The covenant may be extended after that on a month-to-month basis. Pastor Sally also now has a little more time available, so her time was increased from 45% to 55%. This will allow her a little more time for pastoral care and church growth activities such as helping us improve our social media presence. Her compensation was also increased \$1500 per month, with the intention this would enable her to purchase health insurance, now that she is more than 50% time.

On Sunday, October 7, we will receive your offering for Neighbors in Need. N.I.N. is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities.

Also, one-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice.

This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

Our church, FCC San Rafael, has a long tradition of strongly supporting this offering. The Mission Board hopes we will all strongly support this tradition!

September was a busy month for church maintenance. Abby Montessori Preschool wants to begin using again the downstairs preschool space they have been renting for several years, but seldom using. They had the space nicely cleaned and set up when they discovered water coming out from under the walls because the water heater in the long closets behind the walls was leaking. After some plumbing work and much mopping by Louis, David, Neko (their site director), and Francisco of Pilgrim Park, the water heater was replaced. Luckily, the leak was caught quickly, so the damage was minimal.



Other related maintenance has included replacing and painting many pickets in the fence and gate, and replacing the leaky irrigation valves near the preschool entrance.

We also owe thanks to Ronaldo of SOS Electric who repaired the overhead lights in the Community Room without charging us.

Still high on the agenda is refreshing the restroom by the office, which has peeling wall paper. The broken mirror did get replaced, but we are hoping someone will take on the project of beautifying the walls. Please contact David Knopf if interested.



#### **PILGRIM PARK NEWS - WHAT HAVE WE LEARNED?**

Pilgrim Park opened in 1971, 46 years ago. With one exception, church members have been the directors. We've had three professional management companies and many on site management personnel. The present team has been in place for up to 25 years.

Most importantly we've learned that high quality affordable housing can be successful, both financially and in meeting the housing needs of its tenants. But it hasn't been easy at times. Here are the important elements for success:



**Right Configuration** – The church founders chose a plan and size that facilitated effective management and fostered community.

Affordable Cost Structure – The cost of the church donated land and construction cost (financed by a government low interest loan) were low. Thus operations were not burdened by high costs. A project like Pilgrim Park would be almost impossible to create today in Marin without massive subsidies. Yes, in some instances original construction details were subpar and necessitated major repairs about 12 years ago.

**Right Management Team** – We had to fire the original management company for fraud and poor onsite management. The new management company brought in great on site management. Our current team runs a tight ship with great compassion.

**Tenant improvements and Services** – Interiors, landscaping, etc. are maintained like new. We provide extra services to tenants such as annual parties, free food, yoga, a community garden, social service assistance, etc. Thus tenants like where they live and help keep the community in great shape.

**Board Direction** – The Board has determined the above policies and manages only enough to make sure the policies are followed. The Board does not overmanage.

These are the major elements for success. There are many minor reasons for the success of Pilgrim Park.

**Conclusion** – Pilgrim Park is a valuable resource that meets a great community need. The project is financially strong and worth many times the original cost. It is a hidden gem which we can all be proud of.


