Music and Meditation

"Lent" is the season in the Christian calendar that precedes Easter. It is traditionally a time self-assessment and spiritual focus to help us prepare our hearts for Easter. This year, Lent begins on March 6 and Easter is on April 21.

Our theme for Lent is Music and Meditation. Both can open our hearts in powerful ways and lead us into a deeper awareness of the Divine. With that in mind, we will be looking for ways to incorporate more music and meditation into our personal lives as well as into our church

life.

We will begin with a Community Sing-Along on March 3 following worship. We will invite the residents of Pilgrim Park to join us for this festive event.

The Board of Ministry is offering a series of Meditation classes under the leadership of Cathi Fuller. Together we will pray with some of the great Christian mystics, contemplate their writings, and share our own experiences of sitting in silence.



On Wednesday, April 3, we will host a musical concert to raise money for Every Dollar Feeds Kids. It is a wonderful opportunity to be together, celebrate the gift of music, and share some of our surplus with children in need. Invite your friends and neighbors!

Our worship services may include more hymns or Taizé songs. We will learn a couple of meditation techniques and practice together. Some members will share their own experience of spiritual growth that came through music or meditation. If you have an inspiring or uplifting story to share, please let me know.

Do you play a musical instrument or have the ability to sing solo? We would love to include your special gift in worship, perhaps as the offertory, prelude, or introit. Please contact me or our Music Director, Jeffrey Paul.

What are your three favorite hymns or songs of a spiritual nature? What are the songs that lift your

heart, or speak to your soul? I want to put together a list so we can include them in worship. They may be from our hymn-book but they do not have to be. They do not have to be "church" music. They can be from any genre — Broadway musical, Beatles, pop, jazz, blues, rock 'n roll,

contemporary, classical, anything. I want to know what music feeds your soul and helps you grow spiritually.

Many people choose to give something up for Lent as a spiritual discipline – such as television, chocolate, coffee, swearing, alcohol, or clothes shopping. (A friend of mine gave up house cleaning one year...but that did not work out very well.) Another approach is to add a spiritual practice for the season of Lent. I urge you to commit to something that will help you grow spiritually in the weeks ahead

Suggestions:

- Commit to a time of daily meditation and prayer, perhaps using the Upper Room or another devotional book.
- Meditate on a Bible passage every day.
- Sing in the Church Choir for Lent & Easter Sunday. (Rehearsals are Thursday at 7:40 PM & Sunday at 9:20 AM)
- Read a book with religious or spiritual content.
- Be of service: Volunteer a day (or several days) to beautify our church (See David Knopf for suggestions)
- Commit a random act of kindness every day.
- Do an art project with a spiritual/religious theme.
- Forego some luxury and donate the money you would have spent to a good cause.

Allow this Lent to be a special time in which you attend to your soul and your relationship with the Holy One. There is nothing more important. Give yourself that gift.

March 10 First Sunday of Lent

The word of faith is what strengthens us and sustains us. The word of faith is what guides our actions. We will read Paul's letter to the Romans 10: 5-17 and Pastor Sally will reflect on the power of faith and its central importance in our lives.

March 17 The Inner Sanctuary Liturgist Training

Psalm 27 is described as a "Triumphant Song of Confidence" and so it is. It was clearly written by someone whose life was firmly anchored in their relationship with God. We have much to learn from it. The writer asks "to live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life..." We each carry within us an inner sanctuary where we are safe and can commune with God. We will take a few moments to find our way into that sanctuary and sit with the Holy One. Following worship, Pastor Sally will lead a short class on how to be a Liturgist. Those who choose to participate will get some practical hands-on experience that will give them more confidence to serve in this important ministry.

March 24 Soul Hunger

"Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread, and your labor for that which does not satisfy?" Isaiah 55:2. We will reflect on the very real experience of soul hunger and the ways it can (and cannot) be satisfied.

March 31 The Prodigal Son and His Brother

Some people need to go on a journey before they can come home and see it for what it is. Pastor Sally will reflect on this much loved parable of separation, reunion, forgiveness, and celebration. Come to the party!


LET'S PACK THE PLACE!

MOVIE NIGHT MARCH 29 - WON'T YOU BE MY NEIGHBOR

During the run-up to the recent Oscars, one documentary was mentioned most often as the movie that should have been nominated, but wasn't. Here's what critic Ann Hornaday of the Washington Post thought of it.

"Won't You Be My Neighbor? Morgan Neville's admiring portrait of public television pioneer Fred Rogers, feels reverse-engineered to soothe the rapidly fraying nerves of a country mired in political and pop-culture food fights. Revisiting Rogers's signature TV show, "Mister Rogers' Neighborhood," and the kind but steadfastly enigmatic man behind it, Neville has created a film that operates both as a dewy-eyed nostalgia trip and stirring appeal for civility.

"With his singsong voice and reassuring demeanor, Fred Rogers presented a benign, maybe even milquetoasty figure in his cardigan and lace-up sneakers. Underneath the bland



exterior, he was acting as an ambassador for ground-breaking work in child psychology and what we now call media literacy, simply by acknowledging children's fears and insecurities, and gently prodding them to question the values they were being sold elsewhere on the TV dial.

"But to his everlasting credit, Neville doesn't stop there. Rather than a wistful look back at the way things used to be, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" leaves viewers wrestling with our own collective conscience in the here-and-now, contemplating our own commitment to the unconditional love and acceptance that Rogers championed so passionately. As an empathic, enlightened call to arms, "Won't You Be My Neighbor?" winds up being as quietly, cozily radical as its subject."
