Impermanence

Spring is in the air. Fruit trees are resplendent with blossoms. Bulbs have burst forth in joyful blooms. The earth is coming alive again as it does every year.

It is fitting that in the month of April we

would celebrate Holy Week and Easter and reflect on the themes of death and rebirth. As we contemplate the mystery of the resurrection story - so central to our sacred texts - we sense a truth in it whether or not we "believe" it to be "literally true." We sense that love is indeed stronger than hate. We know in our hearts this eternal truth: that which is divine, pure, and holy cannot be killed.

We see all around us that new life arises out of death – that death is, in fact, necessary for new life to emerge. The seed must crack open for the plant

to emerge. In the same way, when our hearts break, they somehow grow larger, capable of more love and more compassion. We know from experience that we must let go of old ways of thinking and old ways of doing things so that new growth can manifest. The cycle of birth, growth, and death are never ending. Such is the way of the world. Such is the world God made. And God said, "It is good."

Last week, Charles Little talked with us a bit about his experience of meditation, a practice he shares with his brother Ben. Charles is currently accompanying Ben through his final stage of life toward that transition we call "death." He said



they were reflecting on the idea of "impermanence."

I was struck by that because I have been thinking a lot about impermanence lately. Like many people, I sometimes resist change. I like the security of things that feel permanent – my home, my routines, my family, my beliefs. It is

tempting to think that permanent things are of more value than things that are not. Yet in a funny way, it is just the opposite. We take delight in children precisely because they will not stay children. We cherish them because we know our time with them is limited. They will grow up and be children no more.

When the blossoms of spring open, we are once again enthralled with the beauty of a daffodil precisely because we had to wait all winter for it - precisely because it is fragile, and we know it will not last. (continued on the next page)

I love orchids. My brother gave me a beautiful orchid plant that bloomed for months. I loved that plant. I cared for it as best I could – misting it every day, fertilizing it weekly. I was thrilled every time a bud would open to reveal the exquisite beauty of those exotic flowers. I grieved a little every time one would wither and drop to the table. Finally, the last blossom dropped, and I was never able to get the plant to bloom again. I gave it to a friend who has better luck with

such things (and better "orchid" light in her house.)

A different friend brought me gift: an artificial orchid that looked <u>absolutely</u> <u>real</u>. You could not tell the difference between it and a growing orchid. It was exquisitely beautiful and best of all... it did not require any work! I did not have to water it, or mist it, or worry about it at all. It was simply beautiful all the time – like a wonderful piece of artwork. I loved it!

However, over time, I stopped noticing it. I did not need to lavish love or attention on it. It did not need it. There was no reason to mist it. There was no reason to check to see if a bud had opened or a blossom had fallen. Neither happened. It ceased to delight me because it never changed. I stopped seeing it. I finally gave it away and went out and bought myself a live orchid that I knew would not last but would bring me joy while it was alive.



As I contemplate my impermanent orchid, I see the wisdom in God's creation. I smile at the whimsical fun of never-ending change. I give thanks for both the solid rock of God's presence and the undulating waves of life's constant movement. I strive to wake up every day and say, "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it." For tomorrow will be different. What I have today is... today. And it is good.

I cherish the time I have with my loved ones. Every moment is precious. I trust that when this phase of life - this cycle of time - ends, a new cycle will begin. There will be a renewal of some sort, a rebirth - for such is the way of the world. Such is the world God made. And it is indeed good.

April 14 Palm Sunday

We will read the story in Luke 19: 28-45 which describes Jesus's triumphal entry into the city of Jerusalem. He is given a hero's welcome. Pastor Sally will discuss the symbolism in the story and reflect on what it means to be a true hero. We will talk about the heroic work that brings peace. As an added treat, Colleen Beery will share with the children and us her knowledge of Mindfulness which can help bring peace to our hearts and calm our emotions.

April 18 Maundy Thursday

At 6:30 PM Just as Jesus gathered with his close friends to share a Passover meal, so we will gather to share a simple meal of soup and bread. Feel free to bring your favorite soup or salad to share or a loaf of good bread. About 7:15 As we move to the sanctuary, we will be treated to a ritual hand washing reminiscent of Jesus washing the feet of the disciples in a sublime gesture of love and humility. In our short but holy worship service, we will hear the story of Jesus's last earthly days as recounted in the Gospel According to Luke interspersed with music and songs. Pastor Sally may offer a brief meditation on a bible passage. The service will conclude in meditative silence.

PILGRIM PARK NEWS



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The absence of a Pilgrim Park update last month did not mean that the winter rains had washed everything away. Rather, the lack of reports simply meant that we did not have much to report. But, that has changed.

More Repairs and renovation – With a break in the weather (2/18), two contractors are busy (1) replacing some windows and siding that had seen

better days; and (2) replacing three second story decks and the second story entrance to Nancy's Smith's apartment. The second contract will take a few weeks. With these three new decks, we will have replaced all of the second storey decks. After the decks are completed, Francisco and our landscape gardener will rebuilt several patio and other fences.

New landscaping for No. San Pedro entrance to church and Pilgrim Park – With the church's help in creative thinking and planning, Pilgrim Park will landscape both sides of this entrance. The first phase to prune the oak trees on either side of the entrance is complete. Ironically, John Starkweather and I planted the three oaks on the SMART side of the entrance about 30 years ago. Denise Walker and Val Sherrer have agreed to work with David Knopf and Bob De Haan to plan creative and welcoming landscaping on both sides. We welcome other church members to join our small and creative group. Contact Bob De Haan to join in the fun. Pilgrim Park will fund and do the heavy lifting to carry out the group's plans.


Mid year operating update - The 61 units are full, and the operating results are on budget.

MOVIE NIGHT APRIL 26 - LAURENCE OF ARABIA

This year we're re-visiting some of the great classic movies, and in April, we're going back 57 years to David Lean's monumental *Lawrence of Arabia*. It was 1962's most-awarded picture, edging out "To Kill a Mockingbird" for the best picture Oscar. It also takes us back to the days when a cast of thousands of actual humans (and camels) performed for real . . . in the desert . . . in front of real cameras and lights, not inside a computer.

The deeper reason to revisit *Lawrence* is that the middle east, and our understanding of it, has changed so much since we first saw the film. In the 60s we accepted the story largely as told: a simple tragedy of Lawrence's noble intentions for the Arabs undone by the greed of the British and French empires. Today, we understand that this was but a tiny early



chapter of a vastly more complex history . . . one more tragic and insoluble than we could have imagined in 1962.


