TRAINS OF THOUGHT by REV. SALLY TRAIN



Last week, Taylor Meehan and I were privileged to attend the Annual Gathering of the Northern California Nevada Conference of the United Church of Christ. For me, the purpose of the Annual Gathering can be summed up in the 3 R's – Relationships, Recreation, and Resolutions.

1. Relationships

Once a year, ministers and lay leaders from all over the conference spend three days together. The most important thing I did at the conference was build, strengthen, and

renew relationships. I made new friends and met a lot of people for the first time. I caught up with old friends and deepened our relationship. I got to know some folks I had met before but never really talked to. And I got to spend some time in the car with Taylor.

Why is this important? Because we learn from each other. Because we support and encourage each other in our ministries. Because if we ever need to work

together, we will already have a connection and a level of trust. Because we find out where the resources are - who is an expert in a particular area of ministry – whom we can call if we have a question or need advice. But most of all, because we are the body of Christ – all of us – together.

2. Recreation

We are so busy at Annual Gathering I would not call it relaxing, but it is restorative.

a. It is so nourishing to worship without having to preach. To drink in someone else's thoughts and wisdom. This year, the keynote speaker was Rev. John C. Dorhauer, General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ, and his words were uplifting and inspiring.

b. It is also nourishing to laugh with a friend, eat ice cream, and enjoy the company of other

dedicated spiritual pilgrims. It is time out of time, a break in the routine, and a chance to replenish your soul. Everyone needs that from time to time.

3. Resolutions

It is at annual Gathering that we conduct the business of the wider church. There were four resolutions this year, and we passed three of them:

a. Declaring Support for the Green New Deal This resolution provides Synod (the National UCC) with the opportunity to declare its support for the Green New Deal, released by Congress on February 7, 2019. By declaring its support, Synod will proclaim the intersectionality of climate justice and all justice issues and offer a path of action and hope by (continued on page 2)

which humanity can address the defining moral issues of our time.

b. Resolution to Become a WISE Conference for Mental Health To become a WISE Conference for Mental Health is to articulate a commitment to fully Welcome, Include, and Support people with mental health challenges and their loved ones and to Engage the intersections of mental health and spirituality/religion.

c. Establish an Action Team to Conduct a Listening Campaign and Bring Recommendations on the Future of Christian Witness at General Synod

The Action Team would conduct its business through the Biblical practices of relational meetings, as used in broad-based and community organizing, so that we may build understanding and trust throughout the settings of the United Church of Christ. Upon listening to members across the denomination, the Action Team will make a recommendation about what General Synod can learn from the Conferences and Local Churches in order to faithfully and relationally enact out wider church's Christian witness, in time for deliberation at General Synod Thirty-Three.

It was a full and productive three days. I hope more of you will schedule the time to attend next year. I think you will find it worthwhile. There is very real value in maintaining connection with our conference ministers and fellow UCC members. Together we are stronger and more whole.

CHURCH VANDALIZED

Vandals struck our church signs several times the last week of June.

First, a large rainbow banner on the preschool fence saying, "God Loves You," and a rainbow flag on the entrance sign were torn down.

A day later a new flag was put up and the next night it was torn down and the flag holder broken. Two days later vandals destroyed the rainbow fish banner which said "Jesus didn't turn anybody away. Neither do we. The United Church of Christ."

We installed a third flag, this time straight up and inside the structure of the sign so that it would be harder to reach, but the next day this too was stolen, and the holder pulled out of its screws.

Police reports have been filed after each incident.

The rainbow symbols were put up in preparation for Pride Week to emphasize that we believe God welcomes all people. The rainbow has been a symbol of hope since the time Noah and the end of the floods. It has been used by early German Protestants, the International Cooperative Alliance in 1921, the World Buddhist Federation in 1885, the Peace Movement of the 60s, and many others.




The current Pride Flag dates from the San Francisco Gay Freedom Parade of 1978, shortly after the Stonewall Riots. Some versions add a black strip at the bottom to remember AIDS victims.

We will continue to find ways to keep the rainbow visible as an important symbol of God's inclusive love in these times.

CELEBRATION OF LIFE FOR NANCY MAHL - JULY 20



A desperate struggling actor puts on a dress and lands a female role in a hospital soap opera. Romantic complications ensue. That sounds like a great concept for a comedy, and it was. *Tootsie* was giant hit in 1982, second only to *E*.*T*. at the box office.

But, with insightful direction by Sidney Pollack and sensitive performances by Dustin Hoffman and Jessica Lange, it was much more: "Tootsie" went deep into issues of gender stereotyping and "me too" moments that are with us still. It was nominated for 10 Oscars, but won only for Lange in the year when "Gandhi" ran the table.




