A Celtic Retreat

As I am writing this, I am getting ready to leave for a retreat at Bishop's Ranch – an Episcopal retreat center in Healdsburg. Many people have said what a beautiful place it is. It feels like a good way to get ready for Lent. But the main reason I am excited about going is to hear John Philip Newell speak. John Philip has written

many books, and is a leading scholar on Celtic Christian spirituality. Perhaps his most popular book and a good overview is Listening For the Heartbeat of God if anyone is interested in learning more.

I have followed John Philip and his writings for about eight years. Several years ago I was fortunate to hear him speak at Chautauqua Institute in upstate New York. A couple years ago while we were still living in New Jersey, I said to my wife,



"If we ever move to California, my hope and prayer would be to hear John Philip speak again. I see he comes to northern California." If this could happen, two of my important worlds would come together – a longing to live in California, and a desire to be drawn closer to the Celtic spirit. This was long before we had any inkling about moving here, but it was a frequent prayer. I am saying this because for one thing, it is a testament to how God answers prayers, and often grants your heart's desire. And if not a particular prayer, then you can be sure it will be something even better.

When we visited Iona in 2012, it changed my life. It gave me a new perspective on my own spirituality and view of the world. Once in a while in the spiritual life, we might have an experience and immediately know, "This is it!" Iona is the cradle of Celtic spirituality,

thanks to Columba and the outpost he set up on the island. Today Iona still embodies the essence of Celtic spirituality. Thousands of pilgrims travel to the tiny island every year for healing and renewal. It is truly a "thin" place as the Celts like to say, a place where the veil between heaven and earth is very thin, and often the two intermingle. There was a certain spiritual energy instilled in me when we visited, and it is something I carry to this day.

John Philip embodies this spirit, as he has spent much time on the island, first as the resident chaplain, and then as a leader for frequent pilgrimages and retreats. When I am in his presence, I feel once again the essence of Iona. When I can't be there, he brings the island to me. Such is his presence. Sometimes you're around a person, and you experience their spiritual luminosity.

As I write this, next Sunday is Transfiguration Sunday, when the radiance of God was revealed in Jesus on the mountaintop. His face shone like the sun, and his clothes became dazzling white. My mountaintop experience was on an island. As we worshiped in the abbey, I remember thinking, "Surely the presence of God is in this place." The spirit of worship and prayer over the centuries washes over every seeker who enters the there. If I am fortunate over the next few days at the retreat, that Spirit will be there again.


March 29 5th Sunday in Lent Raising Lazarus Ezekiel 37:1-14; John 11:1-6, 17-45





It's 1992. We're in the air over the Atlantic. Writer and Professor Joe Castleman (Jonathan Pryce) and his wife Joan (Glenn Close) are on their way to Stockholm to collect a richly-deserved Nobel Prize in Literature. Also on the plane is a writer hoping to write a book about them and the whole business of winning Nobel.

As the swirl of events in Stockholm unfolds we start picking up little bits of personal history and relationship issue that aren't quite as ideal as the press releases . . . and then some that aren't quite so "little" either.

To tell any more would spoil the fun. Suffice it to say that by the end, nothing is what we thought



it was at the beginning, and we are left pondering what price people may be willing to pay to reach the top of their - or their spouse's - profession.

Glenn Close's performance was nominated for best actress in a leading role at the Oscars and at least 25 other awards festivals. She won in many, including "Best Actress" in the AARP "Movies for Grownups" awards (one of our favorites.)

Cuban Family of Five

A family from Cuba is seeking accompaniment support. This is challenging because of the relatively large number. It is a couple, a grandfather and two children. An accompaniment team would need to find a housing host to receive the family initially, and they would stay with that host long enough (approx. 2-4 weeks) to then find more permanent housing. There is a sponsor who would like to make a donation to a congregation, who then uses this money to pay for their basic needs the family's first three months here including a housing deposit, rent up to \$3000/month, food and cell phone.

Permanent housing would ideally be an affordable rental so that once the sponsorship ends, the family can continue renting it on their salaries. The three adults were professionals in Cuba, employed as a mechanical drawing technician, theater teacher, and civil engineer/physical education teacher. They left Cuba for religious and political reasons. They landed in Venezuela, walked through Venezuela and Colombia to Ecuador, where they were denied asylum, and then walked through the Panamanian jungle and Central America, through Mexico to Tijuana to ask for asylum in the US.

After this harrowing journey, they have been waiting in Mexico due to the Migrant Protection Program for their number to be called to present themselves for asylum, and are currently 50 numbers away (very close) to being called. Census 2020

The 2020 Census is a count of every man, woman and child living in the US and is required by the Constitution to be conducted every ten years. It is used to calculate how much money is distributed based on population in a geographic area. It determines fair political representation in Congress , funding for roads, hospitals, schools and fire departments It takes a count of individuals regardless of their immigration or citizenship status. Because of the current political climate, the fear is that many individuals living in our area will not participate in the census out of fear that doing so would put them at risk of getting the attention of the government. There is a lot of fear and misinformation about the census. You can help make sure every person

is counted by volunteering to be "census messenger." There is a training for clergy and lay members on Sunday, March 15, 2020 at Our Lady of Loretto church from 2PM to 4PM at 1806 Novato Boulevard in Novato. Lear answers to common census questions, census logistics and how faith communities can encourage participation among those communities reluctant to do so. 
