Father's Day Reflections

Father's Day is coming soon, and I have found myself being extra nostalgic lately. Like Mother's Day, Father's Day will be different this year. No worship service to attend and seeing my son sitting in the third row with a smile for everyone he meets. No Sunday brunch. No gathering with friends. This is also the first Father's Day I'll be spending without at least one boy present. Due to safety concerns about flying, they are staying put.

I was scrolling through Facebook late one night and the usual parade of memories popped up – Jackson's graduation; Josh's choir performance

at Princeton University; and pictures of when we were all gathered for Father's Day a few years ago. Facebook link featured James Taylor and his son Ben playing the guitar together and singing "Moon River." At that moment, all of my Father's Day memories came together.

I remember singing that song to my sons and trying to get them to go back to sleep at 2 AM. The words always stuck with me:

Two drifters, off to see the world,

There's such a lot of world to see . . .

We're after the same rainbow's end, waitin' 'round the bend.

My huckleberry friend, moon river, and me.



At the time, the song made we dream about their future and what it might hold. I dreamed of where they would go and what they would see. I cherished the anticipation of sharing some of those things together. Now twenty-five years later, I look back with tremendous pride and gratitude for the fine young men they have become, and I hope the world still holds a few more things waitin' 'round the bend that we can experience together.



Ecclesiastes 3:1-11; Sirach 24:1-9 (Apocrypha)

According to Richard Rohr, "Liminal space is where we are betwixt and between, having left one room or stage of life but not yet entered the next." The ability to embrace the unknown and face an uncertain future may be an important part of spiritual growth. The ancients thought wisdom and enlightenment was often born in liminal spaces or thresholds. From sources as varied as the Bible, St. Brigid, and Richard Rohr, discover the importance of liminality and how it can address the current times in which we live.




MISSION BOARD URGENT NEED - CAN YOU HELP?

"...the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you ...a stranger and welcome you, or ...sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.' Matthew 25:37-40 (ESV)

As you know, the One Great Hour of Sharing offering was put on hold this past March because of the Shelter in Place orders. Last year, our congregation generously supported the OGHS international effort. This year, the Immigrant Support work in our local community continues–now more important than ever–because we know the financial impact of the coronavirus on our immigrant neighbors has been devastating.

Annie Song-Hill is active as our representative to the Marin Interfaith Council and the Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity and has provided information about this need.



And now, the Mission Board needs your help. A special interfaith request has been made for financial support to provide temporary housing assistance for immigrant detainees. These individuals are eligible for release from confinement in an effort to reduce the detainee population and the spread of the corona virus. We have also been asked to support the Canal Alliance client support fund (which allows needy families impacted by COVID19 to apply for financial support for food, rent, and other needs).

We are hoping the congregation of FCC San Rafael can raise money for these two projects. As you may remember, support for our immigrant neighbors was one of the top areas of focus for our church in our Strategic Plan. The cost to host a temporarily released ICE detainee for two weeks is approximately \$1,300. If you received a stimulus check from the federal government from the paycheck protection act and feel you could share a portion of that check, it would be greatly appreciated.

Please give generously as the need is urgent and local. You can make your checks to FCC of San Rafael and indicate Immigrant Support in the memo field. You can mail the check with your June pledge.

We, of course, are very concerned about when the church may reopen. We feel that reopening will continue to be in the future, perhaps mid summer. This is based on the information from our state and county officials, as well as from good common sense. The virus is still alive and continuing to infect people. Pastor Jeffrey will continue to do an excellent job of providing the worship service every Sunday.



On that note some of our experts in technology will be planning to

make it possible to have recorded services, as well as live-streaming service in real time, when we are back in our sanctuary. That will be available to all who can connect via the Internet. So if you feel unwell, or just plain out of strength and sorts, you will be able to worship at home.

We are sadly aware that our choir will not be singing together for many months. The choir members and Jeff will work on plans for music for our "Back in church" services. They are also exploring ways to sing "together" via merging individual recordings.


Our financial picture is not great. This is due primarily to lack of rental income. However our members are doing a great job of keeping up with pledging. Thank every one of you!


BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES



Memorial Day weekend the State of California and the CDC both released guidelines for reopening churches. The Trustees are working on finding ways to implement these for our congregation and our renters.

The guidelines emphasize increased disinfectant cleaning, structuring social distance of 6 feet, masks, and handwashing. Certain

church activities such as singing, responsive readings, communion, and passing the peace all need to be re-thought to reduce risk. Meeting outside while the weather is nice will help reduce risk over inside gatherings. Also, congregations such as ours with mostly over 60 year-olds will need to be particularly cautious.

It should be noted that several congregations meeting during this outbreak have been "hotspots" for spreading the virus.

We expect our renting churches, being younger, will be able to start before we are able to..

Whenever we re-start, we will continue making available key elements of the service on-line for those unable, or not yet ready, to attend.

PILGRIM PARK NEWS

Pilgrim Park continues to do well.

The staff have adopted strict procedures to keep everyone safe. Food Bank food and Extra Food deliveries continue with social distancing procedures strictly followed. Several residents have lost their jobs. Fortunately, they are in Section 8 units, so the staff recertifies their income at the new level. Therefore, Pilgrim Park has not lost any rent. Pilgrim Park remains fully rented with a strong financial position.

Last Tango in Halifax (streaming on Netflix)

Halifax in this case is the original one – a small city in West Yorkshire – where, in the 1950s, two teenagers, Allen Buttershaw and Celia Dawson, were attracted to each other, but never managed to connect. Today, both widowed, they re-discover each other on Facebook, and marriage quickly ensues. It's all very sweet. Less sweet are the grown daughters that come attached to each. They are complex, fully-formed characters that we really want to like, but their talent for making spectacularly bad choices keeps getting in the way. "Last Tango" has won a slew of awards and kept British audiences enthralled for five seasons.

Upload (Streaming on Amazon)

This is a new comedy series from the team that created "The Office" and "Parks & Recreation." In the near future, computer science has created an alternative to death: when your body is about to give out, you can have your mind and memories digitally uploaded to the cloud and live out eternity in a virtual afterlife. These heavens are commercial products that vary widely in luxury and cost. The series isn't really science fiction. It's more about the crazy implications of this idea . . . like being able to participate in your own funeral via Zoom. . . Or, what happens if your wealthy girlfriend pays for your upload to a luxury resort, planning to join you there, but then falls out of love with you? Critics loved it, and Amazon has ordered a second season.
