What Gifts Are You Taking into the New Year/

Christmas is over. Gifts have been given and received. By now you have probably taken down your Christmas tree if you put one up this year. Here we are in the New Year, and ready to leave 2020 behind. Good riddance to an incredibly heart wrenching year! Yet, there are some positive things we have learned and can take with us into the New Year. Think of them as gifts – things we might not have thought of during normal times.

This time has offered the opportunity for patience and perseverance. We did not really have a choice, but how we respond makes all the difference. We can take time to slow down and think about the fullness of each moment. Can you say a prayer while standing in line to get a Covid test? What about remembering a favorite verse of scripture and meditating on it while waiting to enter a store that requires social distancing? Patience is a choice. This time of sheltering in place has also made us a more compassionate people. Do you find yourself connecting more with the cashier or deli worker at your favorite market? How is their day doing? Are they going to get some time off over the holidays? In the past, I might have kept looking at my watch, or responded to emails on my phone. These days provide many opportunities to be more compassionate and caring towards others. The very act of wearing a mask can also be a way of showing care for other people.

Another gift that often gets pushed to the background is appreciation. The pandemic has brought to the forefront the many people who risk their health and lives to care for others. These days we think about doctors, nurses and all first responders in a different way. We owe them a debt of gratitude for all they do. They have been pushed beyond the limits of physical and mental endurance, and yet they work tirelessly so that our loved ones will be well cared for if they get sick.

The past ten months have also made us all appreciate our church even more. It has always been important to us, but the simple act of going to church and seeing our friends or gathering for coffee afterwards is something we will never take for granted again.

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I am betting that when we are able to return to church, we will be even more grateful, and eager to get involved once again. The music and choir will return, and our hearts will rejoice.

During the pandemic, many people have found themselves filled with hope, and this has been perhaps the greatest gift of all. Really? During the darkest night of despair? With the tragedy of over 300,000 deaths? With ICU beds full to capacity? Yes. Even then. People have hoped for a vaccine. People have hoped and longed for the chance to be with family again. People have hoped for the time to gather with friends without constantly worrying about getting sick, or attend a concert or play. Someone once defined a human being as someone who hopes. Hope does not offer a timeline or even solutions, but it does offer the possibility of a brighter future and a time when things will be better. That is what keeps us going. As the author of Hebrews puts it, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." (Hebrews 11:1)

Finally, the most important gift we can take with us into the New Year is the gift of love. Paul says, "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love." (1 Corinthians 13:13) The pandemic has taught us that love is both fragile and strong--fragile in that we see how quickly a friend or loved one can become ill and suffer, but strong enough to move mountains and let them know how much they are loved. I have heard more people say, "I love you" while there is still time.

What are your hopes for the year ahead? Now might be a good time to reflect. As terrible as the past year has been, we will be immeasurably better if we take with us the lessons learned and the gifts we have been given – gifts that even the pandemic cannot take away.

Jan. 3 Second Sunday of Christmas It's in the Stars Isaiah 60:1-6; Matthew 2:1-12

Wise men from the East followed a star to Bethlehem, where they discovered the baby Jesus. When they found him, they were overcome with joy. They knelt down to pay him homage, and offer their gifts. We are ready for a new year, a year that will be filled with joy and relief from the harshness of the pandemic. Follow the journey of the wise men as we search for wisdom and treasures in the year ahead.

January 10 First Sunday after Epiphany Fleeing to Egypt Hosea 11:1-9; Matthew 2:13-23

After the wise men departed, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph and Mary in a dream, and warned them to flee to Egypt in order to escape King Herod who wanted to kill the child. How did Mary and Joseph know? What are the signs and dreams we have today? These are some of the questions we will explore.

January 17 Second Sunday after Epiphany God Knows Your Name 1 Samuel 3:1-11

When Samuel was a young boy, he was an assistant to the elder priest Eli. Samuel was sleeping in the temple when he was awakened three times. He assumed it was Eli, but soon the priest Eli realized it was the voice of God. He urged Samuel to listen. What is God saying to you today? What are you called to do and be? We explore in today's lesson ways of discerning God's message to us.

January 24 Third Sunday after Epiphany Fishing for People Mark 1:14-20

As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea. He said, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people," and immediately they left their nets and followed him. A little bit later, Jesus saw James and John, sons of Zebedee, and they also left immediately to follow Jesus. What was it about Jesus that caused these fishermen to drop everything and become the first disciples? What is it about Jesus that makes him compelling 20 centuries later? What does it mean to be a follower of Jesus today?

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January 31 Fourth Sunday after Epiphany **Breaking Down Barriers** Acts 10:1-15

In today's reading, we hear the remarkable story of Cornelius and Peter. Cornelius was a Godly man. He was also a Gentile. Through divine intervention, both men sought out each other. Each one had a similar vision. Peter realized, "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." Walls came down that day, and the first Gentile (Greek) became a Christian. God continues today to break down barriers and welcome all people. What does it mean to be a welcoming congregation?

Ruah Bull, M.A., M.Ed. has been in private practice



as a spiritual director since 2001, working with people in a variety of traditions. After 40 years away from Christianity, during which time she studied and practiced several spiritual paths, she was brought back to Christ through the mystics, contemplative prayer, and the Native American teachings. Ruah teaches centering prayer through Contemplative Outreach, works as adjunct faculty at Mercy Center in Burlingame, and facilitates retreats in prayer, eldering and Incarnational spirituality. She finds her church community in ecumenical circles.

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UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

Budgetary Planning in Uncertain Times

The Trustees have struggled to figure out how to plan the budget for 2021. In the past several years half of our budget has been supported by income from rentals, but this year all renters have reduced their use and payments. So far for 2021 only the Montessori preschool is back to normal. The Ministerios de Dios Latinos is now paying half their previous rent and is using our facility much less than before. We also have a Yoga group using a classroom an hour per week and 4H using the patio for youth events. The th Day Church of God and 12-step groups are



only meeting through Zoom. For budgetary planning we have decided to assume most renters will return during the summer and early fall of 2021. This might be optimistic, and this still leaves a hole in our budget.

How can we make up the deficit? The church has been able to reduce some operating expenses. We did receive a Payroll Protection loan in May to cover two months of salary, and may be eligible for another round of forgivable loans under the recently passed legislation. Importantly, members maintained their pledges in spite of hard times, and some have even been able to increase their pledges for 2012. Foresightedly, the church has been able to establish "rainy day" investment accounts which we anticipate tapping during these fiscal rainy days. More details will be available during the annual meeting on January 31, at 11 AM on Zoom.

MOVIE NIGHT - THE UNDOING and MY OCTOPUS TEACHER

THE UNDOING (Six streaming episodes on HBO)

Danish director Susanne Bier is a Movie Night favorite. Over the years, we've watched four of her feature films. *The Undoing* is her first venture into a made-for-TV series, and it combines her talent at dissecting human character with an ability to keep us guessing and to surprise us with plot twists that are on a par with Hitchcock's best. Grace Fraser (Nicole Kidman) is a wealthy psychologist and her husband Jonathan (Hugh Grant) is a much-loved pediatric oncologist. There is a sudden, brutal murder, and heir charmed life comes crashing down. The series is more about truth and illusion in a marriage than it is a classic whodunit, but to say any more about that would spoil the fun.





MY OCTOPUS TEACHER (90 minutes. Streaming on Netflix)

Octopuses are a hot subject. The 2016 best-selling book, The Soul of an Octopus, gave many of us an in-depth look at this marvelous creature: apparently as clever and creative as our close relatives like chimps and dolphins, but part of an evolutionary branch so distant it might as well be from another planet. The movie follows South African filmmaker Craig Foster during the year he spent free-diving almost daily to follow an octopus he encountered in a nearby kelp forest. The two bonded, and the octopus let Foster film her clever strategies for capturing food and her even smarter ways to avoid becoming food for the local sharks. It all makes riveting, provocative viewing ...
