How Do Churches Grow?

How do churches grow? It is a question I have heard a lot throughout my ministry. As we emerge from the pandemic, it is a timely topic to consider. Most congregations want to grow, though they don't always position themselves to do so. It is a question I have thought about many times, especially when Cynthia and I were starting two new churches with no

members at all. I answer the question in two ways. There are certainly a number of things to do that can be helpful, but primarily it is an attitude and awareness that serves churches best.

I believe there are more opportunities to reach people with no faith community today than ever before with the internet and social media we use every day. The challenge is that fewer and fewer people express a desire to be involved in a church, particularly here in Marin. We often here the line that "People are spiritual but not necessarily religious." Most major denominations have been on the decline since the 1960's or early 70's, and that trend is not likely to change. However, people do value community and spiritual experiences. I am going to list some particular things that have worked for us over the years.

One important piece is knowing the demographics of a neighborhood and the larger community. This is something that can be purchased by churches for a fee. It is hard to grow when you have assumptions but no current data about the people you hope to reach. What are their needs? What is the median age? What about children? How many have a faith community? What are their top needs? What is their housing situation? This gives us a good place to start planning.

When Cynthia and I started two new churches, there were a number of things we did in terms of publicity and outreach. We did a saturation mailing and sent out 20,000 postcards to the postal routes within three miles of the church. We held commu-

nity outreach events on the church lawn with free give aways (pumpkin patch, outdoor concerts, Christmas tree lot). We posted flyers in local establishments such as Starbucks or an ice cream parlor. We subscribed to a service that identified new residents in the area, and sent postcards inviting them to church. Most importantly, there was a hospitality team of people to welcome visitors when they came to church, and dropped a free item (continued on the next page)



(usually a pie!) at their home within 24 hours after they came.

What can we do today that might be relevant and effective? Funds and volunteers are limited. Some things are practical and can be done for free. Some of those things include: check the website frequently in order to make sure it is visitor friendly; create a Facebook page for the church and keep it current. The key with FB is that you invite your friends to "like it," then "share" church information on your page. Have good signage that is relevant and in good repair. Have a way to list current and upcoming events, such as an A-frame sign or banner. Offer free parking during the County Fair and give out bottles of water with the church name on it, and information about the church. Form an Outreach Team that focuses on reaching out to the community. Have a Visitors Sunday when everyone invites a friend; have our musician do a concert and invite people.

Very relevant for today is to effectively "livestream" services. Many people will watch a service online before ever attending in person. Some may never attend in person, but feel connected to the church because of the online service. We also have a huge opportunity now to hire a music director who can infuse energy and joy into the music, as well as connecting with the choir and congregation. What kind of musician could help the church grow? What kind of music would make millennials want to come? Again, many people will livestream first to hear what kind of music is being offered. This is an exciting opportunity going forward where we can excel!

The best strategy for attracting visitors hasn't changed. Members inviting others to church is still the chief way churches grow. It is something we can all do. Think about why you came to church and stayed. When someone asks you what you did over the weekend, you can say, "I went to my church service on Sunday. It was inspiring and gave me a sense of belonging. You are welcome to come with me next week."

I hope I have planted some seeds as we begin to imagine what the future might look like post-pandemic. Growing as a church means creating a congregational climate of inviting. There is no single strategy, but an intention to do a lot of little things well makes the church attractive to others. We are already known as a welcoming church. Let's also be known as an inviting church.

July 4 Hometown Hero (Communion) Luke 4:21-30

"Truly I tell you, no prophet is accepted in the prophet's hometown." (Luke 4:24) With these words Jesus returned home to Nazareth, only to find that he was not welcome. He had been teaching in the synagogue, and read from the prophet Isaiah. He told the people that he was the fulfillment of this prophecy. At first, many spoke well of him. But soon they turned against him. They became furious and drove him out of town. Thomas Wolfe said it best: "You can't go home again." Sometimes we want to turn the clock back, or fall back on what used to work before. Yet Jesus broadened his horizons and ours, and offers us new lessons to be learned.

July 11 Crossing Over to the Other Side Mark 4:35-41

Jesus and the disciples were in a boat on the Sea of Galilee, attempting to cross over to the other side. As often happens in the evenings on that body of water, a fierce storm broke out. The disciples were terrified and frantically began searching for Jesus, only to find him asleep in the stern. "Peace, be still!" His words to the disciples are a word to us when we experience storms and turbulence in our lives. We can safely "cross over" any situation to the other side, knowing we are not alone.

July 25 Hungry for God Isaiah 55:1-6; John 6:1-14

The story of multiplying the loaves and fishes is the only story to appear in all four gospels. That ought to give us an idea of how important it was to the early writers of the gospels. The meager resources of one little boy were enough to feed over 5,000 people, and he trusted Jesus to use what he had. God's provisions and resources are always bigger than our own. Jesus is the one who can end real hunger—hunger of every sort. Jesus said in John, "I am the bread of life. Those who come to me will never hunger." We worship a God of abundance. Jesus still touches lives today in miraculous ways and transforms people's lives, whatever our hunger might be.






SAVE THE DATE! SUNDAY, JULY 18 MISSION AND PILLOW SUNDAY

TRUSTEE'S REPORT



Music Director Search Committee Progressing

The Music Director Search Committee has interviewed six candidates for a new Music Director via Zoom. They will hold several face-to-face interviews (including having the candidates work with the choir) in July, We hope to have the new person start with the choir by Labor Day. The committee includes Louis Frost, Charles Little, Michael Meehan, Lucinda Ray, Val Sherer, and

Tessa Templeman, along with Pastor Jeffrey Cochran-Carney.

Putting on a Fresh Face.

The Trustees are working on several projects to help the church put on a fresh face to the world

- The first is landscaping the area around the cross by the parking lot. Thanks to Pilgrim Park Apartments for underwriting Audel Barajas' landscaping work. He cleared and prepared the site before adding drought and heat tolerant plants and a drip system. It looks beautiful!
- Next, we have accepted a bid to add low energy lights to the cross by the parking lot, the cross at the back end of the sanctuary, and over the steps to the preschool.
- The most daunting refreshening will be repainting the sign by the street. We are talking with several graphic design/sign companies with the goal of improving recognition and having a way to have a changeable line of text that communicates something about our church.

The Trustees hope to have all these done by the end of summer, for a fresh start by the fall.

FIRST PPP LOAN FORGIVEN

In June, the church received official news from Redwood Credit Union and the federal Small Business Administration that our first Payroll Protection Loan of \$12,600 has been forgiven. Amazing Grace! The creative ways God forgives!

These PPP loans have been particularly helpful since few of the groups that have been renting have returned. Our current rent income is still only about one half of our usual rent income. Nevertheless, the church is in OK financial status because our expenses are down some, members have been keeping up with pledges, and we had previously built a "rainy day" fund (which should be called a "drought season reservoir").

MODERATOR'S REPORT

We have a great deal to celebrate as we will finally get to worship inside our sanctuary on July 4th!! We will be asking everyone to wear masks for the safety of all. The Delta variant is hitting hard, we want to welcome everyone, and some may not yet have been vaccinated. The Board of Ministry is continuing to alter some old routines as a precaution. So we will



have some new ways of gathered worship. This is again a work on the drawing board. Still, it will be such a pleasure to be sitting in our pews, seeing our lovely stained glass windows and humming together. Our congregation has done a remarkable job of managing the last 1 + year, and everyone has helped keep us going forward in an unprecedented time. The word "thanks" is truly not enough. How about Huzzah and Hurrah to all members, friends and family of FCC?

I am so proud to be connected with all of you.

PILGRIM PARK NEWS

JUNE BOARD MEETING – The board of Directors met in June to, among other business, approve the budget for the year 21/22, learn that two vacant apartments are being readied for new tenants, and hear that the repairs to the Community Center trellis have been completed and the building repainted.

VACANT APARTMENTS – Invariably one vacant apartment results not only in a new tenant but a reshuffling of Section 8 assignments and tenant occupancies to better match tenant needs with apartment sizes. The current two vacancies, for example, resulted in 6 such changes.



CHURCH LANDSCAPING – Pilgrim Park was pleased to provide the labor to relandscape the area in front of the cross on the end of the church and to install an automatic drip irrigation system and bark to cover the bare ground.

SUMMER PICNIC AND BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION – Now that the virus has cooled down (and assuming it stays cooled down) Pilgrim Park will again hold an end of summer picnic this year for church and residents. The date will be announced soon. Annie Savoy (Susan Sarandon) is a camp follower who schools Nuke in the finer points of life, love and self-confidence.
