


**Friends for Life** 

"I thank my God through Jesus Christ for you all, that your faith is spoken of throughout the whole world." Romans 1:8

As I write this on a warm day in late October, it is hard to believe that we are only four weeks away from Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving always brings for me an opportunity to reflect on all the spiritual gifts and blessings God has given to me as well as to our church. It is a time to count our many blessings and focus on what really matters.

It is not only the season of Thanksgiving, but also Stewardship. # Nov. 28 First Sunday in Advent Standing at the Edge of Time 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13; Luke 21:25-36

The first Sunday of Advent is the first Sunday of the New Year in the church liturgical cycle. It is also the first step in preparing our hearts for Christmas. Nevertheless, with it often comes bizarre images and teachings that seem out of sync to the modern mind. It speaks of the end times with teachings that are "Apocalyptic" and cataclysmic in nature. But for the Jewish people who were in exile, these would be welcome words of hope, and paint a picture of brighter days ahead. If we are able to get past these words and images that almost seem like science fiction, we can find stories and parables that are existential in nature, and remarkably relevant to the timeless truths and longings of what it means to be human. Then as now, telling stories is the best way to tell us who we are. Just like the ancient Israelites and the early Christians, we too are standing at the edge of time.

#### FILLING THE FOOD BANK BARREL



The SF Marin Food Bank is continuing to serve twice the number of households as they did pre-pandemic. Even though businesses are reopening, it will take time for those most impacted by the crisis to get back on their feet, and we do not see the increased need changing in the near future. Because of this, the food bank operations team does not have the resources to drop off food barrels and pick up donations.

However, there are other options for a food drive. We can hold a virtual food drive by registering for a customized fundraising page. We can also hold a food drive without barrels and bring the food to the warehouse in boxes and bags.

During November please remember to bring your non-perishable food items in plastic jars (no glass due to the danger of breakage). Let's fill the barrel and then the Board of Mission will transport items to the warehouse.

#### **NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING UPDATE**

Thanks to all of you who contributed to the Neighbors in Need offering in October! This annual UCC offering supports organizations and projects that are serving homeless and immigrant neighbors or communities. One-third of the funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to provide funding grants to UCC churches and organizations leading justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service project - in their communities.

Our congregation contributed \$885 to this important offering. Thank you for your generous contribution!

## IMMIGRANT ACCOMPANIMENT NEWS AND NEED

Dear Church Family,

In January of 2019, FCCSR formally voted to declare itself an Immigrant Accompaniment Congregation. Over the past few years, through our involvement in the Marin Interfaith Council Sanctuary Accompaniment Network, we have assisted individuals and families



with various kinds of support such as housing, limited monetary support, and driving folks to court appearances. The Marin Interfaith Council Accompaniment Network recently decided to support a Venezuelan asylum seeker. This man (we are keeping his name private for now for security reasons) is 36 years old and here by himself. He is registered with the immigration system and awaiting his first court date. Due to severe trauma on the way to the states, he had to send his wife and son to Columbia in the middle of the journey, where they are now. He is humble, sweet, and resilient and is 100% ready to start his new life. He is Spanish speaking only. He was previously staying in a shelter in San Antonio and arrived in the Bay Area on October 12 assisted by our MIC Accompaniment Team. He is quarantining in a synagogue in Oakland for the next 1-3 weeks.

Annie Song-Hill, FCCSR's representative to the MIC Accompaniment Network, is working with a core group to provide various kinds of support. The immediate need is for housing. The Accompaniment Team from the Marin Interfaith Council would like to find him housing in the Marin area to be close to this support system.

Can you or somebody that you know host a Venezuelan asylum seeker in your house or do you have access to another apartment or living space? Each of us in the MIC Accompaniment Network are reaching out to our respective houses of faith with this request.

We are searching for a 3-6 month housing arrangement for him. As a housing host, your role would be to provide a roof over his head. That is it! There is no expectation that housing hosts provide any further financial or emotional support. More about the hosted housing program can be found on New Anchor's website. (This is a 501(c)(3) working to provide housing to refugees in the Bay Area.) We also have a rental stipend that we can use for room or housing rental, and our team is prepared to offer him resources, food support, transportation and other needs.

#### **Housing requirements:**

- Private bedroom with access to a shared bathroom and kitchen
- Located in Marin, access to public transit or walking distance to a grocery store is a huge plus
- Some Spanish preferred, but not required
