How are you doing?

I wonder about the health of my spirituality these days. You know, my relationship with God. With my thumb on the pulse of my being I wonder what the diagnosis is with my connection with the Divine, the Holy Other, the Source and Ground of my Being. I'm feeling the hurt. I wonder how you are doing.

We've taken quite a hit this last week. When we woke up on Thursday morning life wasn't the same as when we went to bed Wednesday night. Our world wasn't only shaken, or even stirred, things had changed overnight. I wonder about my spirituality. I also wonder about yours.

Sometimes life can change in the blink of an eye whether it's decision from Washington D.C. or Sacramento. Life can also change slowly over time. There are a lot of things that can affect our spiritual equilibrium such as politics, our own health, or the health of someone we love. Let's put natural disasters on that list too. Name it. There are a lot of things in life that can batter and bruise our spirituality. Our spirituality can also grow and mature because of adverse actions that shake the foundations of our soul and the very core of our being.

It's okay to be angry, frustrated, depressed, despondent, confused, and feeling helpless. Or whatever else you might be feeling because of what you're going through. It's okay. Give yourself permission to take what you are carrying and come before God. God actually loves that, when we bring our baggage when we come for a visit with God. You don't have to be perfect and joyful and emotionally balanced all the time. We call that Grace.

Find a quiet place in your home. It could be your favorite chair, the kitchen table, or the chair on the deck outside underneath the lemon tree. You could come to the church during the week and sit in a pew, or stand in front of the altar, or sit in our lovely courtyard. Regardless of where, or when, tell God all about. Then wait for our Still Speaking God to respond. Even if you simply feel Holy Presence, sometimes it's enough to know that God is always present.

We will be worshipping at 10 AM inside the sanctuary and for as long as it is safe to do so. The service will also be available simultaneously at 10 AM on Zoom.


Rev. Peronteau's Notes on the Scripture Selections

Below are the scripture readings from the Revised Common Lectionary for July and August. ****See page 5** of this issue of the TIE for more information about the Lectionary!


The first set of readings from the Old Testament and Psalms is called semi-continuous. These readings loosely follow each other for several weeks.

The second set of Old Testament and Psalm readings is called complimentary (paired). In this set of readings, the connection to the Epistle and Gospel is a more obvious.

THE REVISED COMMON LECTIONARY: WHAT IS IT?



The word "lectionary" is from the Latin meaning "to read." The Revised Common Lectionary is a series of Scripture readings that encourage and bring light and understanding to the Christian faith. The lectionary consists of a reading from the Old Testament (Hebrew Bible), a Psalm, an Epistle (or a reading from Acts and/or Revelation), and a Gospel lesson. The Revised Common Lectionary of 1994 was a revision of the Common Lectionary of 1983, which itself was a revision of the COCU (Consultation on Church Union) Lectionary of 1974.

The Christian Year begins on the First day of Advent, which is four weeks before Christmas. This could fall on the last Sunday of November or the first Sunday of December. The Lectionary begins in Advent reminding us of the hope and anticipation of the birth of Jesus. From Advent through the Season of Easter, the lectionary takes us through the life of Jesus up to and including the death and resurrection. During the long season after Pentecost, we learn about more about the life, ministry, and teachings of Jesus.

By using the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke (with John thrown in at various times) on a three-year rotation, the Lectionary also connects us to the life and teachings of Jesus, the Church Year, and the Christian Faith.

BOARD OF TRUSTEE'S REPORT



Budget Update

With most of our renters back, steady pledging, and some reduced expenses, our budget is on track at this the half-way point in the year.


We expected to have spent about \$85,000 so far this year but have spent about \$62,000. This is primarily due to paying only for a sup-

ply preacher for 3 months, but the figure also does not include our benevolence giving, which is usually sent out at the end of the year. Utility expenses were up about \$1600. We have also had some significant sewer maintenance and plumbing expenses. Our tree removal and pruning expenses es were partially offset by an anonymous gift.

Our pledge income has been on track, with several members having already made their annual donation. Our rental income is a little above expectations due to the Real Life Church paying a little more rent for some extra meetings and retreats. Several 12-step groups have still not returned.

With inflation and now a regular pastor and musician (even though both are part-time), we expect next year to be more challenging financially.





Call for Imagination before Budget Planning

Members of the Mission, Ministry, and Trustees Boards, as well as members of the congregation, should be thinking NOW about special projects for next year. Think bigger---Bell tower? Vamos Mexico Mission Trip? Homeless Shelter? Immigrant Family Sponsorship? Music Festival Extravaganza? Easter Orchestra? Holy Grounds Café? Or maybe just some more flower pots? All these take imagination, involvement, and planning even before we talk money. We begin working on the 2023 budget in August.

AARP TAX ASSISTANCE PROGRAM **AT OUR CHURCH HELPS MANY**

We received this letter from the AARP Tax Assistance Program. The tax assistance program uses our Community Room in the late winter. Nice to know we had a part in getting more than \$31,000 to low-income folks!

June 24, 2022

To the Board of Trustees, First Congregational Church

I am writing to thank you for your support of our program during the 2022 tax season. We greatly appreciated your willingness to help and your flexibility in providing us a workspace.

Our volunteers at the Church prepared 203 tax returns this year for local residents. Although this is fewer than we typically prepared pre-pandemic, we had fewer tax preparers available this year, and were open two days per week rather than three. The ample space you provided us allowed us to have plenty of room for taxpayers to wait, while enabling us to safely distance our tax preparers. Our taxpayers (and we) are especially grateful to you for making the space available on Saturdays. We have no other site in the County that provides this, and it means that many of our working folks can get their taxes done without missing work. It was especially helpful to West Marin taxpayers who formerly came to our special tax day held at Pt. Reyes, which we were unable to hold this year. Many were able to get to our site on a Saturday.

The 203 returns we prepared brought in a total of \$31,213 in Earned Income Credit to lower income taxpayers in our area. Of all returns we prepared, 59% had a primary taxpayer over the age of 60.

The five sites in our Marin District completed a total of 1210 returns this year, or 62% of the 1948 completed in our last full tax season. This compares well with the National figure of 51% of the last full season....

While I hope that next year we are able to return to a more "normal" setup, I am very happy with what we were able to accomplish this tax season. We truly could not have done this without your support.

BACKPACK SUNDAY - JULY 24






Paving -- With the acceptance by San Rafael of the paving, that project is finished.

The Roots of Social Justice

The world in which we now live is much like the one in the middle of the eighth century BCE in what is now present day Israel. Nations were invading other nations. The rich were getting richer and squeezing the poor and the voiceless. The empires were co-opting the Jewish religion for greed and power.

The prophet Amos is widely considered the earliest of the prophetic writings being written somewhere between 760 - 750 BCE. In the middle of the big power grab, Amos speaks the truth of God to two powerful kings; King Uzziah of Judah (the southern kingdom) and King Jeroboam II of Israel (the northern kingdom). Both Kings ruled for 40 years.




