THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR... REV. BARBARA PERONTEAU





I've read it three times and I'm still not sure what exactly it means. Sounds like fun though. BOARD OF TRUSTEE'S REPORT



Highlights of the Trustees Annual Report

Finances—Although we anticipated ending the year with a deficit, we ended the year with a small surplus. Our costs were down because we relied on supply pastors for several months. Also, we received more general fund donations than were pledged. With a full staff, our expenses will be up for 2023.

Facility--Our facility has returned to active use by renters including two churches, 4H, the Threshold Choir, Acqua Montessori Preschool, a Yoga group, Toastmasters, and returning in March, Food Anonymous. The church also makes our Community Room available to the AARP Tax Assistance Program during tax season.

In addition to general upkeep of our 60+ year old facility, one of our challenges related to our facility will be dealing with the leaking roof in the Community Room. We also anticipate polishing our on-line virtual "facility" on the web and You Tube.

Faculty—Our staff has stabilized this year. After Pastor Jeffrey Cochran-Carney resigned due to health problems in February, we heard from old and new friends as supply preachers for several months. We are grateful Rev. Kristi Denham could provide some temporary pastoral support to the congregation.

In May Rev. Barbara Peronteau began as our pastor. She serves as a stabilizing and energizing presence in a "Designated Term" pastorate for at least 18 months. We are also pleased to have Gerry Grosz join us as Music Director, adding a jazz touch and wide experience with church music. Amy Powell continues with her calm and unflappable mastery of office managing. Damian Zilches continues to provide cleaning and janitorial services usually very late at night or very early in the morning.

Thanks to Louis Frost, Caryl Hodges, Michael Meehen, Val Sherer, and Bob Spofford, for serving on the Board.

I am sending out the school update for 2022 a little late .We appreciate the support you have given towards the school, it has made a massive impact. Thank you again, hopefully someday you can visit in person.

Oron Primary School

West Pokot Kenya

Ever year, he Ministry of Education randomly chooses schools in various districts around the country for surprise visits. They visited our school in November 2022 and made positive remarks about the amount of space the children have and where it is set. Of course they also suggested enhancements to meet the government regulations.



In order to meet the requirements of the Ministry of Education, we have to:

• Repurpose an existing building to accommodate a new classroom for the 7th graders. With time and budget, we will continue to build a new block that would have 2 more classrooms.

- build extra toilets both at the dorms and in the school compound
- add a patio to an existing classroom block.

• install electricity into the school compound as the solar panels are effective but dim. This is a costly project but one we will prioritize when more pressing projects are finished.

• The dormitories will need to have fire exit doors which will mean knocking out part of the wall in two dormitories. We were also asked to install new windows without grates.





• Some of the pupils are fee paying and we encourage this, depending on the family financial situation. Your donations have been instrumental amongst many things it also helps families cover the educational needs, in some cases a hundred percent. This allows the children to have a safe place to be with three hot meals a day, clean water for bathing and laundry, a bed and a good education. This in turn gives many caring parents/carers peace of mind to focus on other pressing demands in their lives including finding employment, managing poor

health or struggles of their loved ones. It is not easy choosing who to support when many families ask for assistance but we have to do our due diligence and prioritize the families that could use help the most.

• The current food price hikes have severely affected local people, many of whom seek a hand to mouth existence working poorly paid jobs. Thankfully, the school garden has been a valuable resource to adding to school meals. The garden consists of tomatoes, carrots, cabbage, kale and other indigenous greens. As corn and beans is a staple in the local diet, we hope to plant these as well. We have set aside some land for this, but need access to abundant water supplies.

•The school library that we started two years ago is a popular place with the school children and well used. We will need to buy new books (almost new books), puzzles and stationery. I hope to send 2 or 3 gently used computers or tablets to help the teachers with their lessons and to give the older grades the opportunity to learn some basic computer skills.



On behalf of Oron primary school community, we want to thank you for all the support you have given us. You have truly blessed people who otherwise would have gone under the Radar during a time when things are tough globally.

If you are not already committed to supporting others causes at this time and would like to make contributions towards the community at the Oron primary school, any amount that you can give would make a big difference. All contributions go to the school 100% without a processing fee.

Again this year, Mtelo Ministries has agreed to process the donations and send you tax receipts.


