THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR... REV. BARBARA PERONTEAU



I was not in the pulpit on Sunday, April 30th, because I have off the fifth Sunday of the month. The next one is in July. On April 30,, The Rev. William "Bill" Pifer-Foote supplied for me. The Conference has a list of people who are willing to do "pulpit supply." On that list is Bill and his wife, Christine. Like Susan and I, along with others I know, they are a "clergy couple."

Bill is the "Bridge" pastor at First Congregational Church in Stockton. Bill is available because he also has the last Sunday of the month off. God smiles upon us. Christine is the "Bridge" pastor at Sycamore UCC in El Cerrito. It's an hour and half drive! Before they moved to the Sacramento area, Bill and Christine were members at Calvary UCC in Reading, Pennsylvania, the same

church I attended. We even know

some of the same people. Here's the

odd thing about that. Because Bill

and Christine were doing ministry in other churches, we never met until we moved out here to California. I find that fascinatingly odd.

Sunday, April 30th, my day off, was the Fourth Sunday of Easter and also Good Shepherd Sunday. I'm not sure what Bill planned to preach about, other than his texts are Psalm 23 (you know that one) and John 10:1-10 when Jesus says he is the Good Shepherd. The other text assigned for the day is Acts 2:42-47.

One of the emails I get is called "Sunday's Coming." It's from *The Christian Century*. This week the Rev. Jenna Smith shares her thoughts. The texts give us three different images of shepherding from three different perspectives. In one text we get the image of one being shepherded, from John we have the image of the One who is the Good Shepherd, and then Acts shows us the community that shepherds as well.

The image from Psalm 23 is about our God who brings us through "the shadow of the valley of death." For sure it is appropriate to think this refers to death. However, I think the words "valley of the shadow" invite us

into a larger space inclusive of despair, depression, fear, anxiety, stress, and confusion. That emotional weight that makes it hard to breath. The Psalm reminds us, as Craig Barnes says, that not everything is okay, but in the midst of not being okay, is a God who leads



us through it. We are reminded that God meets us even when, especially when, life seems overwhelming, chaotic, and heavy.

Jenna Smith reminds us that the blessed community, the church, shepherds as well. Through studying the scriptures, being together, sharing, breaking bread and sharing the cup with glad and generous hearts, and praying together, the believing community brings us through our "valley of death" moments.

This image of a shepherding community opens up new possibilities and new spiritual gifts through our gathering, ministries, culture, practices, and environment. In the dynamics of our very fabric of who we are, we are, along with Jesus, a shepherd. May 15th marks a year that I have been with you. We are shepherds together.

Enjoy my day off. I'll see you on the flip side.

Bread for the World Offering of Letters

On Sunday, May 21, after worship, the Board of Mission invites you to participate in writing and sending an Offering of Letters. Working together with many other denominations across the coun-



try and with Bread for the World, we will write letters to our U.S. Representative and our U.S. Senators urging them to act to help end hunger at home and around the world. On the next page, you can see a sample letter.

By taking part in Bread for the World's 2023 Offering of Letters in support of the Farm Bill, you will help support domestic nutrition programs like SNAP, as well as funding for critical international food assistance programs. Tell your senators and representatives to support the reauthorization of the farm bill in order to build healthy, equitable, and sustainable food systems.

The impact of the farm bill is significant. It not only affects the agriculture and food sectors - it can play a huge role in ending food insecurity and hunger in the U.S. and save the lives of millions abroad. This year, Congress is working to renew farm bill programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and international food aid programs.

Here are answers to questions you may have:

- 1. How do I participate? After worship on May 21, take a few minutes to write a letter similar to the sample on the next page. There will also be printed copies of the sample letter that you can simply sign if you prefer, as well as addresses of our congressman and senators, and envelopes. Bring your own return address labels!
- 2. Wouldn't it be better to donate to reputable charities instead of trying to **influence US government aid?** Charitable aid is important, but what is more difficult is changing the systems that allow hunger and poverty to persist. This is why changing the policies and practices of how we deliver assistance is essential to reducing hunger and poverty.
- **3. Why handwritten letters?** Because they work. Research from the Congressional Management Foundation confirms that handwritten, mailed letters are still the best way to communicate with your members of Congress. In fact, 96 percent of Capitol Hill staff reported in a survey that if their member of Congress had not reached a decision on an issue, personalized letters would influence his or her position. Handwritten letters from constituents of members of Congress are always read and logged. You can also write your letters at home and bring them to church with you on May 21.

OFFERING OF LETTERS SAMPLE

The farm bill is our nation's most important national food system legislation. It is critical to the work of ending hunger at home and abroad. Indeed, the farm bill impacts each one of us.
As Congress works to renew our food and farm programs through the farm bill, I urge you to support legislation that builds healthy, equitable, and sustainable food systems.
 Specifically, I ask you to: Increase access to fresh fruits and vegetables by increasing support for produce-specific Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits in the Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program (GusNIP). This provides resources on top of monthly SNAP benefits for the purchase of fresh fruits and vegetables, primarily at farmers' markets, for a limited number of households.
 Eliminate barriers to SNAP for marginalized populations, including ending the ban on former drug offenders, eliminating work requirements for college students, and permitting indigenous communities to administer SNAP and other federal nutrition programs on reservations.
 Keep food out of landfills by increasing support for post-harvest food recovery efforts and addressing the threat to food security posed by extreme weather.
• Support funding for international food aid programs such as Food for Peace.
As a person of faith, I am moved to help and advocate for people experiencing hunger and poverty – no matter where they live. This is why I urge you to support a farm bill that builds healthy, equitable, and sustainable food systems.
