The Great Question of the Age


At the end of the Second World War, America was victorious in Europe and in the Pacific. The GIs were coming home. Having just suffered through the Great Depression and a devastating war, industry and commerce geared up quickly, and the economy was booming. America led the world in design, imagination, and production. America showed the world the sky is the limit.

The imbalance of civil rights notwithstanding, America was riding on a high. God had smiled upon this nation once again, delivering her from the one-two-punch of her calamities. No more depression. No more war. In a re-sponse of faith, a grateful nation gave credit to God for her good fortune by returning to church and to synagogue, each according to their faith. The membership of the various congregations swelled to a new high. Then came Vietnam and Watergate. By the early 1970's church attendance began to decline.

The momentum that had once been all about church growth had shifted toward decline. There are several factors that play into this overall pattern of decline, which I won't go into here. They range from socio-political to disfunction within particular churches to individuals not understanding the faith and having unrealistic expectations about their faith, pastor, or church.

In a recent Fox News Poll asking about the importance of religion in 2023, 39% said religion is "very important." Compare that with a similar poll in 1998 where 62% of the respondents said religion is "very important." In post-pandemic America, this is where we find ourselves.

We, here at First Congregational Church of San Rafael, are not the only ones wondering what's next for us. Every church of every denomination, non-denominational, and of every theological stripe are asking the same questions. As the Golden Gate Association meeting was about to close at the end of the Conference Annual Gathering, the Pastor of Congregational Church of Belmont, Jim Mitulski, asked the question that is on everyone's minds. "How do we stop shrinking and how do we grow?" This question resonated

Exile, Isaiah 56-66 addresses how to be, and rebuild the faithful community newly restored. The purpose for the First Ecumenical Council of Nicaea in 325 CE was to answer Constantine's question of who is the Church, and what does the Church believe? To unify a disorganized Church, Pope Gregory the Great, Bishop of Rome from 590-604 CE, instituted liturgical reforms, including Gregorian Chants. In the Sixteenth Century both Luther and Calvin brought many theological, liturgical, and polity changes to the Church, now reformed. Much of the theology of the mid-nine-teenth-century concerns center around, what John W. Nevin refers to, in the Spring of 1845, as "the great question of the age."

According to a recent article in *Convergence* entitled, "Is it Time to Change the Questions You Are Asking About Your Church?" the author suggests that beginning with the premise that we must be doing something wrong, that a "good church" has people actively participating, that our finances must be at a certain level, when we keep the peace, that our survival needs to look like our glorified past, that these starting points are not helpful and only create unwarranted fear and anxiety. We are not there. Let's not start there.



It is our turn to ask "the great question of the age." As your pastor, let me be clear, that as we ask the right questions, our congregation is coming from a healthy place. Our Boards and Council are functioning in healthy ways. No one dominates the room in an unhealthy manner. Our finances are stable. Our attendance is average. Coming out of the pandemic, I'll take average for the moment. For now. We also have a hybrid worship, meaning, as we gather in-person we livestream on YouTube. Our congregation is caring, compassionate, embracing, affirming and welcoming of one another and "the other." (There is no "other" here. We are all one.) Our starting place is healthy. We are already a "good congregation."

Still, now is the time to start asking the right questions. What might those questions be you might ask? For that answer I refer you to our Moderator, Caran Cuneo's article on **pages 6 and 7** in this edition of the TIE.

Enjoy your summer. If I don't see you in Church, I'll definitely see you in September, as the song goes. Be prepared to rollup your sleeves. We're on a mission to find the answers to "the great question of the age."

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MODERATOR CARAN CUNEO'S IMPORTANT THOUGHTS: WHAT DOES IT MEAN FOR US TO BE THE CHURCH?

As your new Church Moderator, I was asked to contribute an article for this month's edition of the TIE. I have given a lot of thought to what I might write, and welcome your comments, suggestions, and leadership as we move forward in the coming months.

Celebrating 130 years of service to our community, our congregation and our God! That's an impressive history. We can look at our beliefs as stated on our website:



Our church is welcoming, nurturing and educational. We follow Jesus as our teacher and guide. We welcome diversity and we celebrate the unique gifts each person brings. We seek justice for all and harmony among all. We take the Bible seriously but not always literally. The Earth is our home. We believe there is no conflict between science and religion. We are a self-governing church.

In this age, with the changes we have seen in our community and our world, it is important to ensure our resources – time, talent, dollars, physical spaces – are being used to their fullest potential. The old saying of "build it and they will come" no longer applies when it comes to church activities and initiatives, unless they are a part of a very intentional, larger process of discernment and strategic visioning.

Pastor Barbara recently shared ideas from an article from CP Works, *Convergence*, entitled, "Is It Time to Change the Questions We Ask About Our Church?" Here are some of the suggested new questions:

- How is God calling a particular group of people to fellowship, break bread, learn, and serve together?
- Is our church a learning lab for navigating life's changes and conflicts in healthy and transformative ways?
- What kind of church does God need to heal the world in 2023, in 2053, and in 2123?

This leads to a new framework, such as:

- Groups of people are called together by God to do Christian life together.
- The forms this will take are unique and local and will vary as much as the flora and fauna that surrounds us.

- Truly "doing life together" requires more than 1 hour per week in order to share practice, build community, and truly know and be known.
- Christian life together should teach and model healthy communication, and transformational change skills, and must focus on the well-being of others more than ourselves.

I would suggest and welcome us to spend some sacred time in discussion to develop a strategic vision for our future. We are financially sound, with a beautiful and peaceful sanctuary. We



have active ministries with dedicated members participating in Board of Mission, Board of Ministry, Council and Trustees.

As Gil Rendle writes in *Doing the Math of Mission: Fruits, Faithfulness and Metrics*, "is it time to take a new approach – to chart a new course or explore a new path? With the excitement and anticipation of something new, there is also some fear. Let's take the time to name those fears as well as the excitement. What we need now is conversation about purpose, clear outcomes of ministry and conversations about what God calls us to make different in the mission field we are placed."



Parking Considerations

We have a request to ease the access to the church by increasing disabled parking spots, which the Church Council has encouraged. Formal disabled parking spots require wider spaces for van door opening and curb re-working. We would have to permanently reduce our amount of other parking spaces.

An alternative has been suggested. Could we reserve the front row of parking spots for people with mobility limitations just on Sunday mornings? Everybody else then would park across the lane or closer to the street. We would put out temporary signs reminding members of this. This alternative would allow us to continue having the same number of parking spots, and save us the cost of curb replacement. The Trustees plan to try this approach this sumner.

We will have several guest preachers this summer. Pastor Barbara gets off the fifth Sunday of any month, and will then take a two week vacation the beginning of August


