Thoughts on Being Unique

If you are, or have ever been a teacher, or have ever been a student for that matter, perhaps you've noticed that each class has a different personality. The current class is peculiar in ways the previous class or the next class coming up is not. Each class has its own je ne sais quoi that makes it different from any other.

People are like that too. A study of the Myers-Briggs Personality Inventory or the Enneagram shows that each and every person has their own unique personality. Or simply go to Union Square, or your favorite grocery store and watch the people. Back in the day we used to do this at the mall. A day with extend family will give you the same information – each and every one of us is different. Each and every one of us is genuinely and authentically unique. In Chinese philosophy there is the notion of qi (pronounced, chee). The idea of qi is that each of us has our own life force. Our own unique energy. Indeed, everything has its own life force. The black walnut tree behind me, the flies buzzing nearby, the crows, the seagulls, the redwoods, the hills, and the ocean itself has its own life force giving each thing own unique and authentic identity.

For example, imagine Albert Einstein being anything other than a brilliant scientist and mathematician. Imagine William Shakespeare being anything other than an inspired writer about the human experience. There are some, like Hedy Lamar, who had more than one life force. More than one light to follow. She was beautiful, a talented actor, and an inventor of improvements for the stop light, Fizzies, and the rudimentary beginnings of our modern day GPS and Wi-Fi. Could any of these people be and do anything other than who they were? It's who they were that lead them to do what they did. Each and every one of us is born with a light of our own. If we're lucky (privileged?) each of us gets to follow our own star and become who we were born to be.

As this is true for people, high school classes, trees, birds, and oceans, it is also true for corporations and organizations. Churches are no different. In "John's Apocalypse," also known as "Revelation", John writes to seven churches in what we now know as Turkey. Soon after the introduction, John refers to seven

> stars and seven angels and seven lampstands. The stars are the angels. The angels are that direct conduit of lifegiving light and wisdom steaming from God. The



lampstands are the seven churches. I imagine the lampstands as menorahs representing the time in Jewish history when the lights stayed lit for eight days.

Each church has its own shining light that never goes out. Each church has its own qi, its own je ne sais quoi, its own internal life energy that makes it who is. First Congregational is no different.

Landscape Pipe Cracks




