THOUGHTS FROM THE PASTOR... REV. BARBARA PERONTEAU



Sometimes life gets broken. The break could be when your parents divorce, a death of a loved one, or the loss of a job. You don't know how to put it back together. The universe has a holistic rhythm to it. The universe just hums along, but for circumstances beyond your control, you were just disconnected from the Great Circle of Life. There's a hole, a gap, a missing part. Your Life Circle has been broken.

My greatest disconnection, my brokenness from the Great Circle of Life came in the summer of 1968 when I climbed into the back seat of my Dad's 1968 Dodge Monaco, as we drove down Riviera Dr. for the last time heading for Reno and then on to our new home in the southeast corner of Pennsylvania. I had just finished eighth grade at Davidson Jr. High School fully expecting to be a Bulldog at San Rafael High when my life circle was suddenly broken. Life goes on.

In the late Spring of 2022, by a unanimous vote of the congregation I was called to be your pastor. The call was for a "Designated Term." That term was for 18 months. A year and a half. For many and various reasons I was excited about becoming your pastor. On a very personal level, I was thrilled to be here, back in San Rafael. My life circle was reconnected. This was exciting on both a spiritual and a visceral level.

At the end of a "Designated Term" the congregation has a few options it wouldn't have were I hired as an intentional interim. With a designated term you can change the designation to settled, extend the term, change it to a hired position for another term, or choose not to continue our relationship at all. Council chose the latter.

While I was on my vacation in August a poll was conducted regarding my performance here. There are enough of you who are dissatisfied enough that when I met with Caran Cuneo, David Knopf, and Louis Frost to go over the results, it was Louis who said, "We feel you're not a good fit."

From the beginning I said I would respect your decision. I do. For the first several weeks following our meeting, however, I was sad, depressed, disconnected, and unfocused. I was grieving. It's part of the natural rhythm of the universe.

At that same meeting I was offered a hired interim position for an unspecified time. I turned it down. It just didn't feel right to me. It feels as if my spouse wanted a divorce so she could look for another partner but wanted to keep me

around to do the dishes and mow the lawn. It feels creepy. I don't know how to live in that space, nor should I. I am choosing the clean break option.

What's next for me? I don't know. Even though there is no "Plan B" at the moment, I am in a good and healthy place. My last Sunday is November 12, after which I will take the rest of the year off. I have a doctorate to work on. That should keep me out of trouble for a while.

As of this writing I have seven more weeks remaining with you. Two of which I won't be here. October 15 I will be back in Pennsylvania for my 50th High School Reunion and a pilgrimage to Mercersburg. I am also looking forward to catching up with my brother. October 22 is my "Fifth Sunday" off. I'm switching days because I want to be here on October 29th, Reformation Sunday. The Rev. Davena Jones, our acting Conference Minister, will be here, October 22nd, to supply and also help you process my leaving and answer any questions you might have about what's next for you and how to put your Circle of Life back together again. Please be intentional about being here on the 22nd and making that time sacred. It's important. There is loss for you too, and that time will help you grieve as well.

On November 12, there will be a "Service of Release" following the sermon. Davena Jones and a representative from the association are planning to be here.

As this may very well be my last "Thoughts from the Pastor," I want to remind you that God is good!

God is good all the time!

I am forever grateful for this season in time to have been with you. You were a blessing to me.

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING OCTOBER 1

We will be holding the Neighbors in Need Offering on Sunday, October 1. Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Please give generously.

BOARD OF MISSION SUPPORTS TWO LOCAL SCHOOLS

The Board of Mission administers the Pilgrim Hill Fund, which was founded at the time we renovated our sanctuary, over two decades ago. This year we reached out to local elementary schools, inviting them to submit grant applications for a \$1000 grant. We awarded grants to two schools who applied this fall. Here are descriptions of how they will use the money.



San Pedro Elementary School

San Pedro 4th graders will attend a spectacular outdoor education program! This past school year we received a donation from a local community member which helped fund our 4th grade students to attend MOSAIC, an outdoor education program near Santa Cruz focusing on the development of social-emotional skills. This was the first time our school has participated in this program and we found that the experience was extremely valuable for our students! In addition to developing social emotional skills in our 4th graders, the program helped students develop self-confidence and be exposed to students from different backgrounds. We would love to continue this program with next year's 4th graders (and continue this as an annual tradition for San Pedro 4th graders). The \$1,000 grant would be used to directly serve our 4th grade students by supplementing the cost of the program for 90 San Pedro 4th graders (in addition to other funds received from family contributions, our school PTA, other possible donors, and our school budget).

Venetia Valley

Our focus for this project will be our middle grade (6th - 8th) students who vary in age from 11 to 14 years of age. Our goal is to engage all of our 250 middle grade students in a Social Emotional Learning (SEL) project that teaches students how to be productive, responsible and critical thinking citizens in our communities with a major emphasis on social justice. Our students will engage in activities that will benefit the school community as a whole as they model our Falcon Expectations to their fellow students, but also as role models for our elementary students, many of whom are their younger siblings. Our Falcon Expectations are to "Be Respectful, Be Responsible, Be Safe and Be an Ally." Each of those expectations have characteristics of what their behaviors should look like in various settings. These include the classroom, the playgrounds, on the school bus, while out in the community and at home. By incorporating a Falcon Store at Venetia Valley to incentivize our students to earn Falcon Cards to exchange for prizes when they model the positive behaviors listed in our Falcon Expectations, our students will experience how their hard work contributes to our global society, how the economy works and a glimpse at personal financial responsibility.
