Instead, create a clearing in the dense forest of your life and wait there patiently, until the song that is your life falls into your own cupped hands and you recognize and greet it. Only then will you know how to give yourself to this world.

I sat down to write this piece for the newsletter, shortly after our Easter Service, shortly after our journey through Holy week. It was so wonderful to see so many people come together for the Easter Service. The sanctuary had come to life, looking like a garden which had started blooming, making good on the promise that life will start anew. We welcomed back people who had not been able to join us for a long time but are still so much a part of our community. The music was outstanding, and the sound of the community expressed the joy of people's connection with each other, the joy of resurrection in this place of worship. Our thoughts and prayers were with you, if you could not make it to the service this week.

Holy week and Easter tend to be busy times

in the life of the church. It is not unusual to hear the pastor or the people around you say: "Let's just get through Easter and then we can pay attention to other aspects of church life".

But Easter Sunday actually marks the beginning of a whole Easter Season, which lasts 50 days, until the day of Pentecost.

And as much as I love Easter, I look forward just as much to these first days after Easter. For the disciples, it was a time of starting to grasp what their journey with Jesus had been all about. It was a time to find a way to reengage, to reconnect with him, in a way that would most likely take them years to really understand. But in these 50 days, they got a glimpse that he was still dwelling among them

What was Easter about for you this year? Or maybe a better question is: Which part of Easter touched you? If God's presence reconstituted Jesus' life, where do you see God's presence reconstitute your life? What is it that Easter calls you to?

These may not be questions to answer in as much as they are questions to carry with us. Pondering them may be more important than answering them. You may have of course other questions you are asking yourself.

I love these quieter days after Easter, to be with, to ponder all that has happened. It is probably why I connect with the words of Martha Postlethwaite.....

Don't do anything grandiose.
Create a clearing in the dense forest of your life
and wait there patiently,
until the song that is your life



BREAD FOR THE WORLD OFFERING OF LETTERS - APRIL 28

On Sunday, April 28, after worship, the Board of Mission invites you to participate in writing and sending an Offering of Letters. Working together with many other denominations across the country and with Bread for the World, we will write letters to our



U.S. Representative and our U.S. Senators urging them to act to help end hunger at home and around the world. On the next page, you can see a sample letter.

By taking part in Bread for the World's 2024 Offering of Letters in support of the Farm Bill, you will help support domestic nutrition programs like SNAP, as well as funding for critical international food assistance programs. Tell your senators and representatives to support the reauthorization of the farm bill in order to build healthy, equitable, and sustainable food systems.

The impact of the farm bill is significant. It not only affects the agriculture and food sectors - it can play a huge role in ending food insecurity and hunger in the U.S. and save the lives of millions abroad. This year, Congress is working to renew farm bill programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and international food aid programs.

Here are answers to questions you may have:

- 1. How do I participate? After worship on April 28, take a few minutes to write a letter similar to the sample on the next page. There will also be printed copies of the sample letter that you can simply sign if you prefer, as well as addresses of our congressman and senators, and envelopes. Bring your own return address labels!
- 2. Wouldn't it be better to donate to reputable charities instead of trying to influence US government aid? Charitable aid is important, but what is more difficult is changing the systems that allow hunger and poverty to persist. This is why changing the policies and practices of how we deliver assistance is essential to reducing hunger and poverty.
- 3. Why handwritten letters? Because they work. Research from the Congressional Management Foundation confirms that handwritten, mailed letters are still the best way to communicate with your members of Congress. In fact, 96 percent of Capitol Hill staff reported in a survey that if their member of Congress had not reached a decision on an issue, personalized letters would influence his or her position. Handwritten letters from constituents of members of Congress are always read and logged. You can also write your letters at home and bring them to church with you on May 21.

• Reauthorize the Food for Peace global nutrition program at no less than its current level of \$2.5 billion annually and allow additional flexibility to provide the most effective form of assistance in each local context.

PILGRIM PARK NEWS

Tenant emergency services — Les Santos and Margie Rollman recently convened an evening tenant meeting to pass out one emergency backpack to each apartment and hear a presentation of Marin County emergency management folks. The backpack contains a variety of items, such as first aid kits, that would be



helpful in a large scale emergency. The emergency management folks went over the contents and emphasized the important steps to take in an emergency. Red Cross folks attended the meeting. They will meet with the tenants again in about a month. Pilgrim Park has an emergency generator that comes on automatically when electrical power is lost. It powers the Community Center. Thus residents would have a secure place to go for "phone and computer charging," information, heating, cooling, etc. In case of an earthquake, both the Community Center and the apartments meet current structural requirements. The apartments were brought up to code about 15 years ago.

Child Care Center — The independently owned and operated center continues to have about a dozen participants, about evenly divided between toddlers and infants. The center is licensed for 24 children. Interestingly, all of the adult care givers speak Spanish. So, the language in the center is all Spanish. The parents like this, as it gives the toddlers a "leg up" on learning another language. Pilgrim Park's manager's toddler attends the center. Les reports that water is now referred to as "agua."

Activities for older tenants — We have long looked for an experienced person who could, on a part time basis, lead the older adults in chair excercises and other activities. We think we have found the answer in the form of "Susi." She began work about a month ago. So far, so good. One of the first sessions featured chair excercises, a guided walk around the area, and an International pot luck buffet. Bob and Les can attest to the success of the buffet.

Financial Results — Pilgrim Park remains in strong financial position with operating results very close to the budget. Last year's audit (as of June 30, 2023) disclosed no problems of accounting. Pilgrim Park has adequate cash reserves to meet needs and is adequately insured.

Repairs and maintenance — As PP is now in its second century of providing affordable housing, maintenance becomes increasingly important. A contractor recently completed rebuilding a double deck that was leaking. Unfortunately it didn't pass the tests from the recent rains. So, the contractor had to return several tunes to fix the leak. There have been several minor roof leaks in the 9 roofs that are scheduled to be replaced this spring as soon as the rains stop. Fortunately we have a \$300,000 signed contract for the job.

Food — PP continues to receive weekly deliveries of food from the San Francisco/Marin food bank and from "Extra Food," a Marin based food recovery charity. Extra Food collects food from farmers markets and food markets. This food is, in turn, brought to selected food needs sites, such as PP, within two hours of its collections. With the helps of tenants, the food is made available free to PP tenants.

Directors — The next quarterly Zoom meeting was scheduled for March 27. We began the annual budget process at this meeting.

BOARD OF MINISTRY REPORT

The Board of Ministry Team's key role in the church is to coordinate with the Pastor and Music Director in providing meaningful worship services throughout the liturgical year. We address the spiritual life of the church through the following areas: welcome and outreach, worship and prayer, fellowship, and education.



Worship

Welcome Rev. Elisabeth Middelberg! On Sunday, March 17th, the Rev. Elisabeth led worship, and we welcomed her as our new Interim Pastor. Irish music and hymns in honor of St. Patrick's Day added to the jigging sense of joy as well.

Holy Week

In March we celebrated Lent and Holy Week.

We sang Hosanna hymns and filled the sanctuary with palms on **Palm Sunday**. Gerry Grosz accompanied Christina Santschi singing "Ride On, King Jesus" and filled our Sanctuary with awe. The sermon challenged us to reimagine stale images of "meek and mild" Jesus to a fiercely brave and prophetic Jesus who offered a radical alternative, a kingdom of peace and justice, of spiritual wealth of love thus challenging the existing leaders and structures of power and wealth gained by oppression, force and collusion.



On **Maundy Thursday**, we shared a simple soup supper followed by handwashing, exquisite Taize music, a contemplative message and Communion to remember Jesus' "Last Supper" and to be in communion with churches everywhere.

For **Good Friday**, folks braved the weather to participated in a self-led meditation through the stations remembering the scriptural steps that Jesus experienced after entering Jerusalem until his crucifixion and burial. We also meditated to classical contemplative music. We lit prayer candles under the shrouded cross for those we carried in on our hearts and in our thoughts.

Hallelujah Easter Sunshine! We were greeted on Easter by Spring sunshine and a sanctuary filled with colorful flowering plants. The cross, resurrected from its Good Friday shroud, was bursting with sunny sunflowers, fragrant lilacs and chrysanthemums, and trumpeting Cana lilies. The pews filled with regular attendees, returning friends visiting from out of town, and old and new extended family members. The worship was full of messages of transforming love and resurrection joy in scripture, sermon, hymns and choir anthem. Following worship, we feasted on tasty eats and had time to chat or hunt for Easter eggs in the courtyard.



Thank you to all Pastor Elisabeth for meaningful worship and communion, for you who ordered flowers, filled the cross, prepared communion, made soup, brought cheese and bread, prepared and served as handwasher, provided delicious Easter eats, Easter eggs, prepared coffee, planned services, participated in spiffing up the garden for Holy Week, practiced, sang anthems, played hymns, recorded and managed our sound systems. Thank you for contributions toward memorial and celebratory flowering plants, for offering flowers from your gardens for the cross, and for all who participated in the Holy Week worship and community gatherings.

Special thanks to Bob De Haan who created and built our beautiful Cross, designed so we could fill it with flowers each Easter.

Thanks for the joy of reunion, Tom and Nan Truchan for joining us on Easter. Tom was our Music Director for 21 wonderful years prior to retiring and moving near family in North Carolina.

Coming in April

The season from Easter to Pentecost is also called the Great Fifty Days, a tradition inspired by the Jewish season of fifty days between Passover and Shavuot—the feast celebrating the giving of the Torah to Moses. The liturgical color for this season is celebratory white or gold. When the season ends on Pentecost Sunday, white is replaced with red.
