From our pastor, Rev. Elisabeth Middelberg

Well. . . Your interim pastor came down with a light bout of Covid last week. Just when we think we are relatively safe and the pandemic may be in our rear-view mirror, we hear that cases in most states, including California, are on the rise again. The World Health Organization first used the term Pandemic on March 11, 2020, now more than 4 years ago. But experts cannot agree whether we are still in a pandemic. These days, a lot of people refer to the pandemic in the past tense. "During COVID," they say, or, "when we were in the pandemic."

The implication is that the virus is gone, and the pandemic is over. Dr. Mandy Cohen, director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, suggests that "Rather than getting caught up in the semantics of it, people should feel confident that

we are outside of the emergency phase. But I don't want folks to forget that COVID is still here and still poses a risk."

So, at the beginning of the summer, when Covid cases seem to spike, let's keep each other safe. If you are not feeling well, please let us know and rest at home. We are happy to reach out and call you to see if there is anything you need. The services can be followed online, and if we know you are home, sick, you will most likely hear somebody praying for you during the service.

Luckily, I was told in time that I had been exposed. It was in the week before Juneteenth, and I knew that Oak Dowling took a trip to Selma recently. This was a "witnessing tour," which took Oak to Alabama and Georgia. The aim of the tour was to take people into the heart of the civil rights movement to gain a deeper understanding of the historic and continued struggle for racial equality in the United States.

I was so grateful that Oak, with just a few days' notice, was willing to share his reflections of this trip, and I was grateful that I could watch it on our YouTube channel. Bob Spofford had been able to set up the equipment for all of us to listen and watch the images Oak had brought with him. We saw the tomb of Dr. Martin Luther King, surrounded by water. We saw images of the sites where the slave ships landed, images of large sculptures which invited people to come eye to eye, Oak said, with hundreds of years of atrocities and appalling treatment of African people.

The image that stayed with me, was an image of thousands of jars, all lined up on shelves in the Equal Justice Museum. Each jar contained

the soil of the place where a Black American had been lynched. Oak said that there were 4000 jars.... Lynchings, which did not just take place in the South, but even here in San Rafael. The tour also featured the stories of the central figures of the civil rights movement and of others still fighting for justice and equality.

Oak mentioned the work of the "Equal Justice Initiative," an organization well known by those who have read the book *Just Mercy* by Bryan Stevenson. They are doing incredible work, confronting America's legacy of injustice and combatting over-incarceration and poverty. They also continue to educate people about the truth of what has happened in America. I encourage you to visit their website to learn more. Oak will give a longer lecture on the same topic on July 8, via zoom. If you are interested in seeing that, see page 5 of this issue of the TIE. I want to thank Oak for his willingness to take the tour and share his reflections with us. We could all see that it was life transforming.

We have some exciting series and events scheduled for the summer. We know that many people are on vacation but if you are in town, please join us. It is a great time to invite family and friends who may be visiting to join as well.



Were you intrigued by Oak Dowling's presentation during worship in June? If so, you will likely enjoy reading *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson, published in 2014. It was named the named one of the most influential books of the decade by CNN and named one of the Best Books of the Year by *The New York Times* • *The Washington Post* • *The Boston Globe*.

Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Stevenson into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and

legal brinksmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever.

Just Mercy is at once an unforgettable account of an idealistic, gifted young lawyer's coming of age, a moving window into the lives of those he has defended, and an inspiring argument for compassion in the pursuit of true justice.

It is easily available from both Sonoma and Marin County Libraries. The paperback version is about \$15, and you can purchase it at local bookstores or online from a variety of places.

Cathi Fuller, who helped deliver the pillows, reported, "we passed a resident who saw the big bags of pillows we were carrying and with enthusiasm asked if she could put her name on one right away! A couple of staff members who helped us carry the pillows mentioned how they have been seen an increasing number of

more elderly unhoused and housing challenged folk. They particularly often ask if they might have more than one pillow to help with positioning for back or joint pains." **Again, Thank you!**

BACKPACK SUNDAY - JULY 28

The Board of Mission has committed to helping prepare and serve dinner for those in need four times this year. On Tuesday, September 3, a group of us will volunteer for the third time at the Street Chaplaincy dinner at the First Presbyterian Church in San Rafael We will also be volunteering for dinner on Tuesday, December 3.

It costs about \$250 dollars to purchase the groceries for each meal, at which we feed about 80 people. So where does the money come from? The Board of Mission is using money from The Pilgrim Hill Fund, which was created two decades ago by our church as a special fund for mission outreach in our community.



BOARD OF MISSION REPORT ON OUR OUTREACH TO LOCAL ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

The Board of Mission administers our church's Pilgrim Hill Fund, which was founded at the time we renovated our sanctuary, over two decades ago. Last fall our board decided to use part of these funds to reach out to local elementary schools, inviting them to submit applications for a \$1000 grant. We awarded grants to two schools who applied. Here are descriptions of how they proposed to use the money, and their reports from the end of this school year.

San Pedro Elementary School Proposal

San Pedro 4th graders will attend a spectacular outdoor education program! This past school year we received a donation from a local community member which helped fund our 4th grade students to attend MOSAIC, an outdoor education program near Santa Cruz focusing on the development of social-emotional skills. The \$1,000 grant would be used to directly serve our 4th grade students by supplementing the cost of the program for 90 San Pedro 4th graders (in addition to other funds received from family contributions, our school PTA, other possible donors, and our school budget).







San Pedro Elementary School Report

Thank you so much for your generous contribution to our school! In April, my class of 4th grade students attended the Mosaic Project in Santa Cruz. The Mosaic Project is an incredible opportunity for students to meet other kids from diverse backgrounds all over the Bay Area. The lessons they learn focus on mutual respect, open mindedness, self-respect, positive attitude, individuality, and community. For most of our students, this is the first experience they've ever had away from home. It's a huge growing experience, and it's incredibly transformative for our school community. This is a safe and nurturing environment with a staff that is truly focused on being peacemakers in the world. Here are a few photos to share.

Venetia Valley School Proposal

Our focus for this project will be our middle grade (6th - 8th) students. Our goal is to engage all of our 250 middle grade students in a Social Emotional Learning (SEL) project that teaches students how to be productive, responsible and critical thinking citizens in our communities with a major emphasis on social justice. Our students will engage in activities that will benefit the school community as a whole as they model our Falcon Expectations to their fellow students, but also as role models for our elementary students, many of whom are their younger siblings. By incorporating a Falcon Store at Venetia Valley to incentivize our students to earn Falcon Cards to exchange for prizes when they model the positive behaviors listed in our Falcon Expectations, our students will experience how their hard work contributes to our global society, how the economy works and a glimpse at personal financial responsibility.







Venetia Valley School Report

Principal Pepe Gonzalez reports how much the "student store" has meant to the middle school students. They have earned Falcon Cards for demonstrating positive behaviors and are able to cash them in and get tangible rewards that were purchased with your generous donation. The other component to the funds we received is the support that we have been able to fund from our local partner, Youth Transforming Justice (YTJ.) This group, YTJ, has supported our teachers and administration team on how to build better positive school climates and on how to restore issues when harm has been done between students.


