From our pastor, Rev. Elisabeth Middelberg SHARING MEALS TOGETHER

For two years, we have met on-line, almost every week. We meet for support, for fellowship and to resource one another. We, in this case, are a group of about 8-10 chaplains who all work in different retirement communities in California. One of the chaplains had quite a bit of money left in her budget and suggested to her Executive Director, that it get used for a retreat for this particular group. And so, as I am writing this article, I find myself in Santa Barbara, enjoying this rare opportunity to meet in person with people who all know what it is like to be a chaplain.

We have some wonderful programming, and then of course share some meals together. I love our time at the table maybe even more then the programming time. There are conversations that unfold, we laugh together, and we get to know each other in ways that are just delightful.

There is something that happens when we come to the table, sit down, and open ourselves up to be sustained not only by the food but maybe even more by being in each other's presence. Tables are such a place of human connection. And sharing tables with other people reminds us that there's more to food than fuel. We don't eat only for sustenance.

Rev. Barry Jones says that one of the most important spiritual disciplines for us may be to recover in the kind of world in which we live, is the discipline of table fellowship. In the fast-paced, tech-saturated, attention-deficit-disordered culture in which we find ourselves, we need to recover the art of a slow meal around a table with people we care about, and also with people we may not know that well.



His words reminded me of the times we have gone to La Hacienda after church and have a meal together. No place to go, nothing left to do, just allowing ourselves to connect with each other is such a gift, such a blessing.

BOARD OF TRUSTEE'S REPORT

More on Church Finances

How much pastor time do we need to develop the dynamic church we are becoming? This is a question the Trustees, Church Council, the Search Committee, and ultimately the congregation need to face. It matters as we try to attract applicants for our settled pastor position.

The last few years we have hired pastors for 60% time. And we have kept them busy. The applicants we received were mostly retired ministers. Would offering 75% time attract a wider range of applicants? Would that provide enough time for the outreach, liason, pastoral care, and resource development needed to help us grow?

But can we afford to pay for 75%? Not with our current income.

In November we will all be asked to reconsider our pledge of time and talent for next year. We will challenge ourselves to fund a budget with adequate time to attract quality candidates. Can you help?

In November we will ask for your answer.

Landscape Upgrade Progress

On Sunday, Sept. 29, after worship, Bob De Haan presented information about the landscape upgrade along North San Pedro Rd., which will be sponsored by Pilgrim Park Apartments.

The Landscape architect designed the space using 3 principles:

- 1. Plants that are native to our area
- 2. Low water usage using recycled water
- 3. Low maintenance.



The design includes 5 or 6 coastal live oak along the road and clusters of manzanita, salvias, Douglas Iris, sage, western red bud and other local plants, mostly along the pathway and out from the pathway to downstairs.

Pilgrim plans on purchasing the plants this fall and begin planting once the rains start. In the meantime, the necessary permits are being sought from the county and Marin Municipal Water District. The cost and labor will be covered by Pilgrim Park, Inc., and the church will continue paying for the water.

The plan preserves almost all of the current trees and will add regular water to the pines" "In a few years," Bob says, "it will look like a forest."

NEIGHBORS IN NEED OFFERING - OCTOBER 6

BOARD OF MISSION AGAIN SUPPORTS TWO LOCAL SCHOOLS

The Board of Mission administers the Pilgrim Hill Fund, which was founded at the time we renovated our sanctuary, over two decades ago. This year we again reached out to local elementary schools, inviting them to submit grant applications for a \$1000 grant. We awarded grants to two schools who applied this fall.

Students will draw connections between the immigrant experience with which they are familiar - the students' family, friends, neighbors, and many students themselves have experienced this journey and understand why people take such financial and other risks to come to the US.

Our Church Assessment Tool (CAT)is here!

What is the CAT?

The CAT is a Church Assessment Tool consisting of 90+-question online (or paper) assessment of a congregation that is completed by members of a church. We affectionately call it a CAT-SCAN. It generates a report called Vital Signs.

The Purpose of the CAT

Using the Congregation Assessment Tool is like taking our church to a doctor, a travel agent, and a tailor. It gives all of us a read-out on the health of the church, a sense of where members think the church should head in the future, and a description of the church as a unique body of people.

The CAT is a benchmark tool of 90+questions that helps determine our congregation's current vitality, the priorities of where our congregation wants to head, the areas that need immediate attention, and our congregation's culture.

Who should fill this survey out?

We hope that everybody connected to the church would be willing to fill out the survey. The more people fill out the survey, the better we understand some of the vital aspects of our community. This understanding will help us in many ways. We will be able to look at ways that we can serve the community and its ministries better, and it will help us in our search process for a settled pastor. The clearer we are describing who we are, what is important in the life of the church, the higher the chance that we will attract a pastor who is a good match for the church.

What is the next step?

If you have provided us with a current email address, within the next week, you will receive a unique web link to complete the assessment online. If you would prefer to take the assessment using a paper copy, please let us know, and we will provide one for you along with a self-addressed stamped envelope. We will also make time and laptops available in the next couple of weeks after church, to assist people in filling out the form.




