Moving through Lent, guided by the Parables

'Words have power. They shape how we see the world, how we see each other, and how we see ourselves. And when certain voices are silenced—whether by policy, by rhetoric or by fear—it's up to the rest of us to ensure they are heard.'

These words were part of the newsletter which the Marin County Free Library (MVFL) sent out in honor of Women's history month. The author stated that there is power in stories to connect, to educate, and to create understanding. MCFL is committed, he says, to make space for the voices of all people, including the voices of women, transgender, and non-binary people. Our



communities are shaped by all of our voices. Our communities are not whole when voices and people are diminished or erased.

Jesus knew the power of stories well. He often gave the people a story, a parable, to answer their questions and to get his point across. It seems to have been his main teaching tool.

The word parable, carries with it the idea of "placing alongside." Our lives are placed alongside the story, and the point of the story is meant to stir something deep within our spirits, which causes us to align (or re-align) our lives with the point or moral of the story. (Biblical hermeneutics, June 2020)

Parables are not static; they are a living breathing force. For sure, the original listeners would have heard many different nuances. which we in our time no longer hear. The parables never gave the people a clear answer to the questions they posed. My guess is that people wanted a straightforward answer, wanted to know who or what was right or wrong, wanted to hold on to clear definitions. Instead, Jesus gave them parables, stories which inherently held nuance, complexity, and multiple layers of meaning—just like our lives do. I think we are invited, like the generations before us, to place our lives alongside the stories, which Jesus told, to let them stir within our spirits as we are seeking to align ourselves with the teachings of Jesus.




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On our journey, through Lent and into Easter, we are letting ourselves be guided by the gospel of Luke. We have looked at several of the parables seeking to find direction and inspiration for how to respond as a people of faith, to these complex, polarizing and often frightening times we are living in. I especially like the three parables in Luke 15, the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the prodigal son. Each of the story ends with a communal celebration. Jesus tells the stories of restored community. "Come rejoice with me", He says. Our communities only become whole when we search for what is being lost, or when we commit to protect and restore what and who is under a threat to be erased.

- The history of the communities of people of color
- The voices of the people in our trans communities
- Lost protections of the earth
- Lost care for the immigrants among us
- People who have gone missing.
- The stories and experiences of the people honored in the Smithsonian Museum

The searching for and restoration of what is lost is sacred and holy work. It is also slow work. No quick fixes here. It is inspiring to see how other people and organizations are also participating in this work, sometimes leading the way, like the MVFL, speaking their commitment to make space for the voices of all people.



During this time of Lent and Easter we are invited to draw close to God's Spirit, A Spirit of Restoration, which is always working to bring healing and wholeness to all the earth.

May we be ambassadors of that Spirit, participating in creating wholeness in a fragmented world.

Please join us for Holy Week and a grand celebration of Easter.



BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT



Repairs, Repair, Repairs.

Audel Barajas completed three projects for the church.

1. He installed a French Drain to divert the ground water that had been seeping into the preschool downstairs.

2. He ground down the concrete sidewalk edges that had been rising, mostly due to tree roots.

3. The dilapidated bench near the sidewalk entrance to Pilgrim Park has been removed.

The Trustees decided to have locks installed on the "library" cabinets in the community room and the sound system cabinet. Keys will be available in the office.

Also, the Marin Municipal Water District is requiring the church to install a back flow preventer on our water system to make sure we do not contaminate the MMWD's system. This work will involve shutting down our water for at least a day, so it will be done during the preschool's spring break in April.

Speaking of Repairs...

While our Music Director Gerry Grosz is recovering from his upcoming heart repair surgery, we expect him to exhaust his sick leave. The Trustees have authorized continuing his average monthly pay for the 3 months rehabilitation time expected.

Going Beyond Repair

Previously, the Trustees believed the fence for the preschool just needed an extensive repair of replacing posts. The Board of Directors of Pilgrim Park agreed with the architect that a redesigned new fence would add to the attractiveness of the landscape, as well as to the attractiveness of the church and preschool. It is hoped that this work can be done during the preschool's June summer break.

The landscape project has received most of the needed permits, but a few remain due to unexpected requirements of MMWD.



MARCH BOOK CLUB - THURSDAY, APRIL 3, 6 PM - NEW TIME



The NEW time for our book club meeting this month has been changed to 6 PM. The book we have chosen for our next Book Club meeting is *Washington's Farewell*, by John Avlon. In *Washington's Farewell*, John Avlon offers a stunning portrait of our first president and his battle to save America from self-destruction. Avlon, editor in chief of *The Daily Beast* and author of *Independent Nation*, brings to light Washington's goodbye by elucidating what it meant not only during the early days of the republic, but its lasting effect through the centuries.

Washington's Farewell Address was a prophetic letter he wrote to his fellow citizens and signed from a "parting friend," addressing

the forces he feared could destroy our democracy: hyper-partisanship, excessive debt, and foreign wars. In it, Washington called for unity among "citizens by birth or choice," advocated moderation, defended religious pluralism, proposed a foreign policy of independence (not isolation), and proposed that education is essential to democracy. He established the precedent for the peaceful transfer of power. '

Avlon's thesis is that there is much to gain from reexamining this 6,000-word adieu. Within this final address, which was never actually spoken but printed in a national newspaper, Washington implores posterity to value moderation, fiscal discipline, and private virtue. Avlon expertly explores the document by examining Washington's shortcomings; he accrued debt in his youth, was not as educated as his contemporaries, and owned slaves. In time, Washington overcame such flaws, some might argue too late. The full text of the speech can be found in the appendix along with further reading.


ELDERS MEET ON MAY DAY, THURSDAY, MAY 1, 6 - 7 PM
